TRUSTEE'S SALE OF LINVILLE FALLS AND SURROUNDING LANDS.

Under and by virtue of the power of sale contained in that certain deed of trust dated the 31st day of August, 1912, between G. H. Aubrey and the undersigned Trustee, (which deed of trust is recorded in the office of Register of Deeds of Burke county, in Book U, No. 3, pages 126 et. seq.) and upon default made in the payment of the notes secured by said deed of trust, which said default has continued for more than ninety (90) days and upon application of some of the persons who are entitled to the monies due upon the notes or bonds secured by said deed of trust, the undersigned Trustee will, on Monday, July 3rd, 1916, sell at public auction at the Court House door in the town of Morganton, N. C., for cash to the highest bidder and during the legal hours of sale, all those tracts and parcels of land lying and being in the counties of Burke and McDowell, in the State of North Carolina, described and bounded as follows, to-wit:

1ST TRACT:—Beginning on a double oak and pointers, the north-east corner of the W. T. Austin 33 acre grant No. 6477 and runs thence with the line of said grant south 85 poles to a black gum; thence with line of said grant east 30 poles to a chestnut oak, the corner of said Austin's grant; thence south with line of said Austin's grant in part, and the lines of the Biggerstaff 35 acre tract and 1 1/2 acre tract, and the Penland 1 1/2 acre tract, 200 poles to an old sourwood stump and pointers in the line of the J. W. Wiseman 11 acre tract, the south-east corner of the Arnold Penland tract; thence east with the line of the Biggerstaff 54 acre tract in part and with the line of the Packard and Harrison tract to a stake or rock at a point 67 poles east and 100 poles north of the spruce pine, beginning corner of the 253 acre Franklin grant No. 6384; thence south 100 poles to a stake, the north-east corner of the Franklin grant No. 6384; thence east 107 poles to a rock and pointers, the north-east corner of the J. G. Wiseman 778 acre tract; thence south with the line of the said 778 acre tract 70 poles to the edge of Linville Gorge and Bull Face Point; thence around said Bull Face Point with the edge of said gorge on the east side of Linville river to a point due south of the aforementioned north-east corner of the 778 acre tract; thence south 100 poles to a double oak and pointers, the south-east corner of said 778 acre tract; thence west crossing Linville river 130 poles to a chestnut oak on top of Locust Thicket Ridge, west of the Bluff and in the county line between Burke and McDowell, and in the line of Grant No. 8929 issued to Walter Brem; thence same course west 40 poles to a cucumber tree; thence north 48 degrees west 80 poles to a sugar maple tree and white oak; thence north 28 degrees west 40 poles to a beech; thence north 15 degrees west 31 poles to a linn tree marked with a large rock on the west bank of North Fork river, the beginning corner of the J. G. Wiseman 778 acre

tract; thence in a northerly direction with said North Fork river 194 poles to a stake in the line of the old T. C. Franklin tract, the north-west corner of said Wiseman 778 acre tract; thence east with the old T. C. Franklin line 66 poles to a white oak, Franklin's old corner in the line of the 253 acre Franklin grant No. 6384; thence north with the line of said grant and with T. C. Franklin's old line 24 poles to a white oak, now down, the north-west corner of the 253 acre grant No. 6384; thence east with the line of said grant No. 6384 to a stake in said line, the south-west corner of the A. A. Wiseman 7 acre tract; thence north with the line of the said A. A. Wiseman 7 acre tract 15 poles to a stake, his north-west corner; thence with the north line of the said A. A. Wiseman's tract to a point in the J. W. Wiseman Contour line which is 30 feet perpendicular above Linville river in a north direction to a stake in the J. W. Wiseman tract and the S line of the Arnold Penland tract; thence west with the line of the Arnold Penland tract 35 poles to the south-west corner of the said Penland tract at a point 80 poles of the sourwood stump and pointers, corner of the 54 acre Biggerstaff tract; thence north 15 poles to the line of the old Franklin mill tract; thence with line of the mill tract west 5 poles to a stake in the Biggerstaff line, the south-west corner of the mill tract; thence north 14 poles to a stake, the south-west corner of the Biggerstaff 12 acre tract; thence north with line of the said tract 77 poles to a mahogany stump, the north-west corner of said 12 acre tract; thence south 31 degrees east crossing Linville river 55 poles to a hemlock, Henry Franklin's corner; thence south 13 degrees east 14 poles to a locust, Henry Franklin's corner; thence north 78 degrees east with Franklin's line 26 poles to a stake, Henry Franklin's south-east corner, thence north 12 degrees west with Henry Franklin's line and the line of the Biggerstaff 35 acre tract 115 poles to a stake, Henry Franklin's corner in the line of the Realty Loan & Guaranty Company's 5 acre Grant No. 17625; thence west with the line of said grant to Linville river; thence up the river as it meanders to a point due south of the maple beginning corner of said Grant No. 17625 and a corner of the Austin 33 acre Grant No. 6477; thence a due north course to said maple beginning corner and thence with the line of said Austin Grant north 60 poles to a stake and stone, the north-west corner of said grant; thence with the line of said Austin Grant east 50 poles to the beginning, containing 940 acres, more or less, the said tract including the Great Falls of Linville river and the bed of the said river from Bynum's Bluff to the north-west corner of the Biggerstaff 12 acre tract.

3RD TRACT:—Also another tract lying on Linville river north of the first tract but not joining same. Beginning on a hemlock, Dellinger's corner, on the east side of Linville river, and runs north 30 east 152 poles to a stake and pointers; thence south 30 degrees west 180 poles to a stake; thence north 60 degrees west 70 poles to a stake in the Dellinger line; thence north with said line to the beginning, containing 100 acres, more or less.

4TH TRACT:—Beginning on a chestnut oak, James Franklin's corner, and runs south 200 poles to a sourwood stump and pointers, Franklin's old corner; thence east 32 poles to a stake; thence north 9 degrees east 244 poles to a stake in Vance's line; thence west 48 poles to a chestnut; thence south 23 degrees west 32 poles to the beginning, containing 54 acres, more or less, same being tract conveyed by J. W. Carpenter and wife to M. C. Biggerstaff and T. D. Crockett by deed dated June 9, 1899, and recorded in Book Q No. 2, page 494 and covered by Grant No. 13768 to J. W. Baking Powder, Sugar and Silk Stockings From Sawdust.

Manufacturers' Record. Baking powder, sugar, artificial silk, silk stockings, twine, furniture, milk bottles, rugs and "the strongest paper ever made" are some of the things which the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association of Chicago reports as being successfully produced at Madison, Wis., in the forest products laboratory of the United States Department of Agriculture.

According to this story, sent out by the Lumber Manufacturers' Association, demonstrations were recently made at Madison to the members of the association which proved amazing to them. This "sawdust" laboratory, as it is called, is producing baking powder from sawdust, and the visiting lumber people were treated to biscuits made with this powder and "sawdust sugar" instead of the use of the usual tartaric acid baking powder.

Among other things made of sawdust or converted mill waste is artificial silk. It is said that this country last year produced sawdust silk stockings to the value of \$5,500,000. The same laboratory is said to be turning sawmill waste into binder twine, rope, woven furniture, milk bottles, woven matting rugs; and likewise it is claimed that the "strongest paper ever made is produced in a simple manner from the waste of Southern pine," and it is said if the new process should be used generally, it would increase the paper production in the South 20,000 tons daily.
