
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

President Wilson stopped in the busy whirl of his strenuous political campaign to endorse the Red Cross Seal movement and the work of the Anti-Tuberculosis Association. He says: "May I take this occasion to express to you my deep interest in the work of the National Anti--Tuberculosis Association and my hope that its work is growing in efficiency and extent from year to year? May I not particularly express my interest in the Red Cross Christmas seal, whose sale has been the means of raising funds for the work? It seems to me that this is ar particularly interesting and sensible way of enabling the people of the country to give this great work their support."

The Red Cross Seal movement is getting well under way in North Carolina for its most successful season. Dr. L. B. McBrayer of the State Sanatorium is again executive secretary and has chosen an efficient corps directors and assistants. By Thanksgiving it is expected that every town in the State will have arranged through a chairman or a committee for the sale of Red Cross Seals during the Christmas season. This movement affords every town an opportunity for doing something to aid the fight against tuberculosis both at home and throughout the State.
