REPUBLICANS WORKING.

The Republican party in Harnett County has begun its season's "bookings" by issuing membership cards. These cards read that applicants for membership not only desire to connect themselves with the Republican party, but pledge their "bestest" efforts for the success of the party and its principles.

It may not be the intention of the Republicans to make their party such an exclusive affair that members will be admitted only by card. Rather, it may be presumed that the leaders are casting about to test their real strength. In other words, to find out who's who.

It may be safely said, however, that only Republicans will sign up for membership. Certainly no Democrat will pledge allegiance to an opposing party—at least, not in Harnett County.

The card system is being used in every county in the State, it is understood. By which it may be inferred that the Republicans are determined that the Democrats will not be allowed to "go on forever" unchallenged.

The wisdom of the card system may be questioned, but that is their business, not ours. Only in passing, it could well be remarked that "I sign nothing!" is the buffer most commonly used when literature is "propaganded" as between men and measures.

Well, well. Let the Republican party compile its card index strength in pledged members, and the free and unaltered Democrats will come along and pile up such a majority that the little stack of cards will fall and become worthless to the "beneficiary" membership.

EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR 50 P. C. SOLDIERS

Washington, Feb. 25.—Interest in the United States Army recruiting drive has been increased by the announcement of the War Department that more than fifty per cent of all the enlisted men in the army are now getting educational and vocational training.

This means that success in fitting soldiers for work in civil life is certain.

The report from the Adjutant General's office follows:

"Of a total of 172,266 enlisted men present for duty 93,423 or 54 per cent are receiving training which will fit them for civilian occupations. Of these 24,918 or 20 per cent are taking educational or vocational courses and in addition 58,505 or 34 per cent are engaged in duties which provide training in some trade or vocation."

The War Department leads with 90 per cent getting training and the Philippine Department is second with 75 per cent. The Northeastern, Hawaiian and Western Departments and the Tank Corps have about 64 per cent. The Adjutant General's office is last with 10 per cent. The other departments average around 50 per

cent with the exception of the Panama Department which has 44 per cent and the American forces in Germany at Coblenz with 25 per cent.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE COMING STATE BY STATE

Ten States which have not passed on the woman suffrage amendment are: Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Louisiana, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia.

Oklahoma is holding a special session of Legislature this week which will probably ratify the amendment. West Virginia is also to act this week.

Washington is said to be sure to ratify. North Carolina is classed as hopeful.

There is strong opposition in Vermont. Connecticut is said to be unlikely to act.

Tennessee will delay. Delaware will not hold special session.

Louisiana will act in May. Prospects are not hopeful in Florida.
