> Following a visit of a score of business men and farmers from this community to Moore and Montgomwas held this week to perfect a fruit growers' organization in Lillington. R. J. Potter of Wallace, a fruit grower of vast experience, who took the trip with the party into the adjoining counties, attended the meeting and gave some valuable advice on how to start orchards.

An organization was started with \$100,000 named as capital and \$00 acres of available land near Lillington on the A. & W. railroad. Subscription of stock was freely indulged. in and it is a practical certainty that things will be moving in the right direction within a few days.

While the organization is not as yet perfected, plans are being put on foot to secure trees for fall planting before the supply is run into "culls." Tractors will be put in to break up the land and orchards will be put out on all available land within the limit of capital obtainable.

Further details of the fruit growing movement will be given later when things take on a more definite shape. But it is safe to be assured that fruit growing is taking a hold on the people hereabouts, and there will be something doing in that line Miss Margie Hamilton spent Sat. this year.
