The director hopes that everyone will feel it his or her part to offer any suggestion as to the best method of forming and training these classes. and as to who is the logical choice for leader and where the location of the community center is. The leaders and centers have been chosen tentatively by the department, as a means of getting started, but in no certainty is the choice conclusive. It is left to the leader to arrange his class, drawing members from different churches and Sunday schools or from any available local source, care being taken to make the class as representative of the township as possible. Time and places of rehearsals and arrangement of program will be left entirely to the township repregentatives. But the director suggests that the program be a varied one-including hymns, patriotic longs, choruses, quartets, duets and the like, although group singing will receive most consideration from the judges.
