In the light of these figures, it is manifest that the recent reduction of wages authorised by the Labor Board. estimated at from 10 to 12 per cent. in no sense meets or solves the problem of labor costs, and in no way

makes it possible for the railroads to afford a reduction of their reve-

Thousands of Rates Already Reduced Indeed, during the plat year there have been between four and five thousand individual reductions in freight rates. On some railroads the reductions in rates have amounted to more than the reductions in wages so far made, and on many other railroads the

reductions in wages allowed no net. return on operations, but merely provided against the further accumulation of a deficit.


