## Poultry School and Egg Show at Dunn

A one-day Poultry School and Egg Show will be held in the Dunn Municipal Building for all Harnett farm men and women Tuesday, Jan. 29, at 10 a. m., County Farm Agent C. R. Ammons stated today.

This Poultry School and Egg Show will be conducted by C. F. Parrish, in charge of poultry extension, from State College, Dr. R. S. Dearstynne, head of the poultry department at State College, Mr. C. J. Maupin, assistant extension poultryman at State College, and Mr. T. T. Brown, assistant poultry specialist at State College. This Poultry School and Egg Show will also be attended by farm men and women from Johnston, Sampson and Cumberland counties.

The Dunn chamber of commerce and the merchants of Lillington, along with the county farm and home agents, are sponsoring the show. Some 15 to 20 prizes will be awarded and farm men and women are invited to enter their eggs in the show. An entry will consist of one dozen eggs, either brown or white shell. Eggs to be entered should weigh between 24 and 28 ounces per dozen, should be clean, uniform in size, color, shape and of good shell texture.

The program is as follows: 10 to 10:30—General Outline and Things to Encourage in the Poultry Industry this Year—C. F. Parrish. 10:30-11—Poultry and Turkey Diseases—Dr. R. S. Dearstynne. 11 to 11:30—Why Buy Quality Chicks?—C. J. Maupin. 11:30 to 12—Eggs from the Nest to the Table—T. T. Brown. 1:30 to 3—A general discussion on poultry and turkey problems. 3 to 3:30—Announcing the egg show winners and summary of the day's activities.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL PROGRAM TO GO INTO ALL CHURCHES

Arrangements were practically completed to take the Sunday school program into each of the 27 Baptist churches in the Little River Association at the conference held at Antioch church last Sunday afternoon. Seven pastors, seven superintendents and more than a hundred officers and teachers met with General Superintendent G. G. Page and Associational Missionary Miss Zula Rogers, and conferred for an hour and a half on the matter of carrying the very best in Sunday school work into every church in the association during the first half of February.

Under the leadership of group superintendents, Leary Knight, Erwin Stevens, H. H. Hamilton and Dr. C. D. Bala, teams of three made up from the workers in the churches will visit each of the churches and present a program of an hour and a half to the workers in the church.

"Launching a Century with Christ" is the general theme of all the meetings and an effort will be made to get the officers and teachers in each Sunday school to accept the full program set forth by the Baptist Sunday School Board of Nashville, Tenn.

This effort is being made simultaneously in all the 925 associations of the convention which has 26,000 local churches with a total membership of over five million. This is one of the largest simultaneous efforts ever undertaken by any religious body.

Aside from the consideration of the effort to go into all the churches with the Sunday school program, departmental conferences were conducted by the departmental superintendents for the betterment of the work of the various ago groups back in the churches.

Under the general leadership of Miss Rogers, dates will be fixed for the various churches and teams assigned. The meetings may be held any night in the week, Sunday afternoon, or at the preaching hour on off Sundays in part-time churches. The time for the visit of the team may suit the convenience of the local church.

## METHODIST COLLEGE ADVANCE PROGRAM

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church is launching a program to upgrade and strengthen its church colleges. The Methodist Church feels that it must keep its colleges on par with the state supported educational institutions. Such a program has been launched in the Western North Carolina Conference, and at the November session of the North Carolina Conference (of which the local Methodist Church is a part) a like program was launched. Rev. W. A. Cade, who grew up at Cokesbury, one of the nearby communities, and who now is one of the most prominent members of the North Carolina Conference, was appointed executive secretary of the College Advance program. The Lillington Methodist Church will launch its local program of the College Advance Sunday. Rev. Mr. Cade will preach at 11 o'clock hour, after which he will hold a brief meeting with the officials of the church.

Soldiers who enlist or re-enlist in the Regular Army are granted recruitment furloughs of from 30-90 days, depending on the length of previous service.

## Enlistees, Officers Offered Commissions

War-time army officers today are being offered commissions in the regular army under provisions of recently enacted legislation which authorizes an increase in total officer personnel to 25,000.

Any male citizen who served as an officer any time between Pearl Harbor and December 28, 1945, is not over age in grade, and was honorably discharged or is now in service, is eligible to apply for a commission.

Commissions, with age and length of service considered, will range from second Lieutenant through Major, but applicants will not be eligible for a grade higher than that held during wartime.

Enlisted men who served as officers also are eligible to make application for commissions.

Application forms, which may be secured from any Army Installation or Recruiting Officer must be completed and in the Adjutant General's office Washington 25, D. C., not later than March 1.

Although some officers previously submitted applications for commissions, it will be necessary for them to resubmit application under provisions of the new law and on the current forms.

Men honorably discharged from the Army in the grade of private, who have served as long as 6 months may now be enlisted with the Regular Army rating of Pfc.

The Army enlistment period is no longer limited to a three-year hitch. Enlistments for 18 months, 2 years, or 3 years, are now authorized.
