TRACT No. 1: "All that certain tract or parcel of land containing 25 acres, more or less, and is situate in Johnsonville Township, Harnett County, North Carolina. It is the identical tract of land which was inherited by grantor from her father, Ben McKelthan (deceased) in the divisions of his estate by agreement of the heirs of said Ben McKelthan. 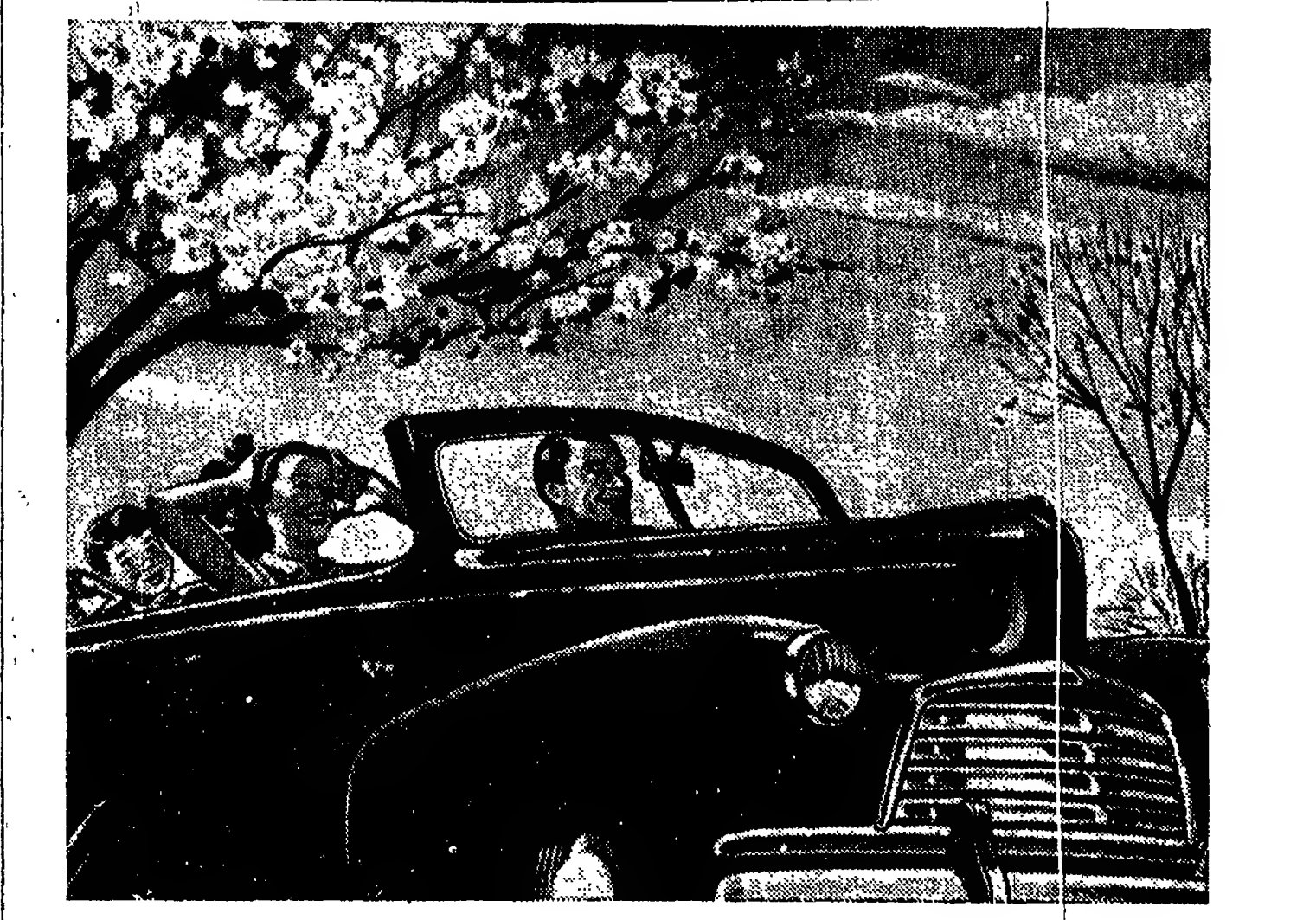
