Immunization Clinics Have Been Completed

Immunization clinics held at various points throughout the county have been completed by the Harnett County Health Department.

During the last year, 10,275 people were immunized against typhoid fever, 307 against whooping cough, 1,526 against smallpox, 1,235 against Diphtheria, making a total of 13,343 complete immunizations.

People who took one or two doses, but failed to take the complete treatment, were not counted in these figures.
