HOUSEHOLD HINTS

It has been said that you can tell whether a woman is a good housekeeper by the way she hangs her laundry on the line. What do you think?

We've all heard women complain from time to time on the boredom and drudgery of housework. Things often seem uninteresting and take too much time because the work is done in a slipshod manner.

System and efficiency pay off, no matter what the job may be, and satisfaction comes from a job well done.

It is important to instill into children, who are at an impressionable age, that any job is worth doing one's best. This is important training, and parents must be examples in this to their children.

Fried breast of chicken, one of America's favorite food treats, has more to offer than fine flavor and substantial protein and calories. Recent research by poultry specialists of the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture, shows that the breast of chicken is an excellent source of niacin, the important anti-pellagra B-vitamin. Tests show that the concentration of this vitamin is especially high in the flesh of broilers and fryers.

These findings indicate that chicken breast contains more niacin than any other muscle meat thus far tested and compares favorably with pork liver and beef liver which have been recognized as among the richest sources of this vitamin.

People with a preference for light or dark meat may be interested to know that the dark meat is superior in the vitamins, riboflavin and thiamine, but that the white breast takes first place in niacin.

Save more salvage fats or be prepared for a real soap shortage next winter, says Mrs. Estelle T. Smith of State College.

Mowing permanent pastures regularly during the growing season is essential to destroy weeds and other undesirable plants.

Home Demonstration Club News

Farm and Home Week is August 19-24. Club women from every county in the state are looking forward to attending this year. Miss Ruth Current, State Home Demonstration Agent, mentions below some of the highlights of Farm and Home Week classes:

Tuesday and Wednesday: "Ideas on Home Decoration" will be discussed by Mrs. Stella R. Cusick, who has just finished work in interior decorating in New York City. She will discuss new trends, tricks in fabrics, and colors to give attractive interior decoration effects.

Tuesday: "Making Comforts from Feathers." Miss Rose Ellwood Bryan will give a demonstration and discussion of the processes and methods of preparing the feathers and making comforts. As a result of this demonstration many of the women should be able to use their old feather beds to make comforts.

Wednesday: Tour of the home of Mrs. J. C. Castlebury, Apex, president of the Wake County Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs. Her home is a most attractive, modern farm home. It is located about 12 miles from Raleigh. It is arranged for convenience and comfort and displays the excellent taste of Mrs. Castlebury. Any person attending this class who has a car and can assist in the transportation, please do so.

Friday: "Selection and use of electrical equipment available to make wash day easy" will be given by Mrs. Marguerite G. Surles, Home Service Director, Carolina Power and Light Company. She will discuss and demonstrate the selection and use of many pieces of electrical equipment that are now or will soon be available for the farm home laundry.

The purpose of the Family Life Program is threefold: (1) learn to understand our children better so there will be less friction within the home; (2) learn how personality and character develop out of little every day experiences; (3) understand what it is that makes family members enjoy home life. (Individual check sheets will be used to help parents to determine their success as a homemaker.)

Miss Alice Sundquist, National Clothing Specialist, and Miss Iris Davenport, Editor of the Woman's Department, Southern Agriculturist, will be with us during the Farm and Home Week.

Miss Sundquist will hold classes on Tuesday and Wednesday on Clothing Buymanship. When is a dress a good buy, what do you expect of the material or garments you buy today—service, comfort, durability, good looks, or what? The manufacturers say they make what the customers want.

Miss Davenport is a North Carolina girl and a former clothing specialist in Kentucky. She knows women and what they like and should have in clothes to be smartly dressed. Her subject for Tuesday and Wednesday is "Distinctive dress—what to wear and when or how to look your best." On Friday morning she will give a demonstration on "Care of Hats" and make a new hat from an old one, along with many suggestions for style for the coming year.

Public speaking and personality development—class title, "Speaking is Fun." Subjects to be discussed: Introducing our speaker, blue printing our speech, telling our facts, persuading our listeners. This class is to be conducted by Mrs. John B. Martin, Jr., of Washington, D. C. She appeared on the Maryland Farm and Home Week program and comes to us highly recommended. She is delightful, young, and most attractive. She has three children. She is a Vassar College graduate and has done much magazine and radio writing and speaking.

Have you ever felt the need of knowing just what was the courteous thing to do, how to entertain a guest, how to make introductions? These and many other things that pertain to the niceties of every day living will be discussed Tuesday and Wednesday by Mrs. Hazel E. Wheeler, former Home Agent of Halifax County.

On Friday, "Simple Entertaining," will be demonstrated by Mrs. Mildred Seabers, Home Economist of Duke Power Company. Small electrical equipment such as the toaster, waffle iron, percolator, will be used to show how simple, attractive refreshments may be prepared with the minimum of effort. Attractive table settings for home and company occasions will be shown.

Farm men and women are interested in improving health conditions in their homes and communities. To give them a more complete understanding of the situation, Dr. Seiz C. Mayo, Rural Sociologist, State College, will discuss in an interesting way "Facts about health and medical care in North Carolina." Following Dr. Mayo's talks Tuesday and Wednesday, Miss Helen Martinkainen of the U. S. Public Health Service, will discuss "Mobilizing community resources for health."

She will tell of services available and will suggest plans for communities to follow in using these services.

On Friday, the latest information on nutrition will be brought by Dr. G. Howard Satterfield, Biochemist, State College, when he discusses,

"Health through good nutrition." All of the health classes will be held in the cool, comfortable Varsity Theatre just across Hillsboro Street from the campus.

Many advances in methods of food preservation have been made in recent years. Freezing foods for the home is a popular method of food preservation. Freezing can assist in improving nutritive value and palatability of many foods and in addition, help to make each home more self-sufficient in its food supply. The importance of variety, quality, and careful preparation in order to obtain high quality frozen fruits and vegetables will be discussed and demonstrated in this class.

Many well-worn garments, which have done previous service may add considerably to the comfort, attractiveness and color of a room. The beauty of hooked rugs made at home depends on color arrangement, shape, design, or division of space and materials. These important factors which go to make well-made homemade hooked rugs will be considered in classes taught at Farm and Home Week. There will be a variety of hooked rugs and mats displayed to illustrate the points discussed.
