Criminal Intent

In at least four instances stones have been used this season—presumably to increase the weight of tobacco piles on the warehouse floor, according to C. D. Baucom, superintendent of the State Agriculture Department's Weights and Measures division.

Although refusing to give the name of the warehouse or the town in which it is situated, Baucom asserted that a warehouse operator reported finding rocks in four baskets. Baucom said the rocks varied in weight from six to 15 pounds each.

He said no warrants have been drawn, pending other violations, adding that he had no definite information as to who placed the stones in the baskets.

Conviction of this weight violation carries a fine of \$5,500, 30 days to a year in jail, or both, according to Baucom.
