two weeks." Bloody droppings, chicks becoming droopy, not eating, and appearing chilly are good symptoms of the disease.

As a prevention to Coccidiosis, Mr. Parrish advised poultrymen to keep the houses dry, avoid overcrowding, add fresh litter often or clean the house often.

If an outbreak of this disease occurs, remove the litter from the brooder house and replace with fresh dry litter every other day for several days.

The house need not be cleaned while this treatment is used, Mr. Parrish said.

Treat Cucumbers For Downy Mildew

Protection of cucumbers from damage by downy mildew is a simple process and a valuable one.

Dusting with tri-basic copper sulphate, containing 5 per cent metallic copper, is a relatively easy way to insure a good crop of cucumbers, say Dr. D. E. Ellis and R. S. Cox, plant pathologists with the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station...

Tests conducted last year, during the serious outbreak of this disease, have shown that the tri-basic copper sulphate dust is an effective means of controlling the disease.

winners at the Lower Coastal Plain Experiment Station at Willard, and average yield of 261 bushels per acre was obtained on a plot receiving 10 applications of the dust.

The dust should be applied on or before June 10 in the southern part of the State. If wet weather has prevailed during late May or early June, under these same conditions, the first application should be made by June 15 in the northern part of the State.

Dust should be applied once a week until harvest is completed. Early in the season, an application of 15 to 20 pounds per acre is enough, however, as the plants become larger, this should be increased to 40 to 50 pounds per acre.

A rotary hand duster may be used for applying the material to small areas of one to two acres. For larger areas, horse or tractor drawn equipment will be needed.

At Home On The Farm

with The City Cousin

As soon as the news reached me that some latter-day Cyrus McCormick had invented a contraption to do away with hand-picking of cotton, I hurried right over to State College.

I had just set foot on the campus when I halted a gentleman who looked like he would know all about it. "Got a mechanical cotton picker around here anywhere?" I asked him, nearly out of breath.

"A what?" I told him somebody had invented a machine that picked cotton, and that I wanted to get a look at it, in operation, if possible.

"Oh, you must be the City Cousin!" He laughed a couple of times, practically choking. "Anyone else would know that they won't be picking cotton by hand, or any other way in North Carolina for at least four months!" With that, he made his way down the street, doubled up with agonizing laughter.

To save whatever was left of my face, and avoiding further embarrassment, I confined my attempts along this line to getting closer to the target. I deduced that the Extension Service's Cotton Marketing specialist would perhaps be less inclined to chide my ignorance.

I was, after considerable time, introduced to Dan Holler, the man who wears the fancy title above. He made it clear that the mechanical cotton picker was not invented yesterday, as I had vaguely imagined, but that it was a relatively new piece of equipment. I told him I supposed half the big cotton farms in the state had such a machine, but he hastened to correct that error.

"There were only three operating in North Carolina last year," he advised me, adding that the experiences of these operators turned out to be both good and bad.

"What do you mean by that?" I asked the expert, as he answered phone calls, dictated letters, and thumbed through a copy of the 1945 Farm Census.

"Well, Cousin," he says, "a lot must be learned about the mechanization of the cotton industry. One

operator geared to mechanical handling may often be entirely dependent upon another mechanized operation—"

"For instance?" "Then Holler explained that the powered picker doesn't work just right where grass is left in the rows, and the flame cultivator won't get the weeds out if the rows have been placed on a ridge."

"And ridge planting has been a custom in this section for a long time," he tells me.

When I asked him for some figures on the success of last year's operations, Holler told me that George Ashford of Red Springs, picked forty-nine bales at a cost of \$17.90 per bale with his machine, and the tractor was used for regular farm work. Hand picking costs would have run about \$42.25 per bale, he said.

As I got up to go, and thanked him for his trouble, Holler said something that sounded kinda important to me: "Cousin," he says, "mechanized farming calls for some very close supervision, else North Carolina farmers will waste thousands of dollars on expensive equipment!"

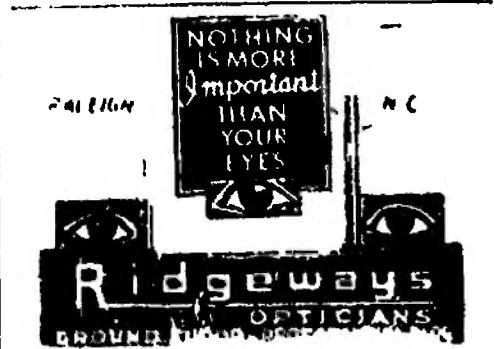
