Coccidiosis is a germ disease that may spread from one bird to another through droppings, by the use of second hand feed bags, or may be carried on the shoes of poultrymen or visitors, he explained.



TYPHOID vaccine prevents Typhoid Fever. Take 3 doses, one week apart, every 3 years; or if you had 3 doses last year, take one dose every year from now on.

DIPHTHERIA deaths usually occur in very young children. Toxoid should be given

between the ages of 6 and 9 months. SMALLPOX vaccine should be given in childhood and once in later life.

WHOOPING COUGH-Immunization is required by the North Carolina State Law before reaching the age of 1 year.
