GETTING READY TO START WORK OF APPRAISING

SUPERVISOR BERLES JOHNSON EXPECTS TO BEGIN SEPTEMBER 1 ON JOB OF RE-APPRAISAL OF PROPERTY IN COUNTY

With his township appraisers all picked except in Averasboro, where he expects to make selections this week, Tax Supervisor Berles Johnson informs The News that he is counting on starting the work of re-appraisal of property in Harnett county on or around September 1.

The supervisor has adopted the plan of appointing two appraisers for each township with the exception of Averasboro where there will be three.

As a sort of over-all group he will have three countywide appraisers, these to review the work of the township groups and to tackle such intricate appraisals as may come within a countywide tax basis.

Supervisor Johnson hopes to have the work completed by the first of next January so that the list takers can begin their work for 1948 abstracts with the new or revised appraisals.

The supervisor again emphasizes on the eve of the beginning of the re-appraisals that it is not the intention of the county to make a general boost in values for the tax books. Rather it is for the purpose of replacing all property on the books on an equitable basis.

GREENSBORO WOMAN DROPS RAPE CHARGE

CLAIMED SHE WAS ATTACKED AT GUN'S POINT IN HARNETT COUNTY NEAR SPOUT SPRINGS

(Sanford Herald)

One of the strangest cases to be investigated by local law enforcement officers in many a day ended in exactly nothing Sunday night when a young Greensboro woman who at first claimed to have been raped at gun's point in Harnett county Sunday afternoon refused to file charges when her alleged attacker was captured at Kannapolis after a state-wide police alarm. Kannapolis police freed the man late Sunday night.

Sanford became the base of operations for a state-wide man-hunt early Sunday evening when the young woman, whose name was not revealed, telephoned to the local police station from the bus station here. Responding to the call, Policeman M. M. Harris heard her tell how she had been forced at the point of a gun to submit to one of four men with whom she and a woman companion had ridden from Carolina Beach to the section of Spout Springs road where the attack took place near the intersection of Spout Springs road with Highway 421, in Harnett county.

Because the alleged attack happened in another county Policeman Harris called State Highway Patrolman Bill Tinsley, who in turn summoned Harnett Sheriff Bill Salmon and broadcast a statewide alarm for the car and occupants, a description of which had been provided by the woman.

Hospital examination of the woman who claimed to have been attacked proved that relations had taken place, Patrolman Tinsley said.

The young woman told officers that the four men had picked them up at Carolina Beach, to take them to the bus station at Wilmington and had continued, supposedly taking them back to Greensboro. Names or residences of the men involved were not learned here.

Although the state-wide police alarm brought arrest of the alleged attacker at Kannapolis later Sunday night, the young woman refused to
