Who's Your Registrar?

Where and How to Register Births and Deaths

Now that the State law requires that every birth and death be registered, many people want to know more to have such matters done, and how.

It is all very simple. There is one person, known as the Local Registrar, appointed in each incorporated town, village, city, and in each county by the Board of county commissioners. This local registrar, with all blank forms, is furnished with all such records each month to the State Registrar.

In the case of a birth, the doctor or midwife who attends the birth reports the birth to the local registrar, and the certificate is made out giving the name of the child, sex of the child, the names and addresses of the parents, and so on. There is no doctor or midwife attendance, the parents are required to attend to this matter.

In the case of a death, the doctor fills out a certificate of death on a form furnished by the undertaker, and the statistical items, such as date of birth, occupation, and from any one of such such information, there is no undertaking, and the one who sells the casket is required to place a blank certificate and a printed one (both of which are required by the State Board of Health) in each casket.

The local registrar becomes a very important personage in every township. Be sure to get in touch with him at a birth or death in your town. As every town in the State wants registration of every birth occurring within its limits, a very good idea of local registrar posted in every township and deaths occurring in the neighborhood. Some may be omitted.

Three Babies Scored Perfect

Better Babies Contest Had Successful State Fair.

The second annual Better Babies Contest held at the State Fair in all points a great success. The examinations showed three 100 per cent babies. Of the three babies scoring perfect, Joseph Sam Wobble, of Carthage, one month, was voted by the judges as the best baby—the State Champion Better Baby for 1914. He was awarded the gold medal offered by the Woman's Home Companion. The other winners, who received bronze medals according to divisions:

Champion city girl, Annie Coppage, Raleigh, score 100; Champion city boy, John Vernon, Burlington, score 100; Champion rural girl, E. Randolph Miller, Oriental, 100%; Champion rural boy, E. Joseph McCallill, Franklinton, score 99%.

As gratifying as the contest as a whole proved to be to the promoters, they regard as of special value the following points in evidence: A keener and more assured interest on the part of the parents, a deeper appreciation of the meaning of the Better Baby movement, and the higher score of the average baby. As an example of this, the prize-winning baby of this year scored only 96 last year; the mother through the contest last year learned the standard for a perfect baby and returned home to give her baby the benefit of her knowledge. Another mother whose baby last year won a prize entered another prize-winning baby this year.

Let the spirit of the Better Baby movement reach every mother in the State.
