How joyous must have been the meeting with the aged Father and mother as they stood with a beckoning hand ready to clasp her to their bosoms.

Mrs. Copeland did not think she was going to live long, she with her family had just moved from the neighborhood she had grown up in, to Ahoskie she remarked to a close friend just before leaving her old friends; that she was going but when she come to her church again she would be brought in her coffin and so she was. Mrs. Copeland was an ardent church worker. Well can it be said of her she hath done what she could, she send in her money for the Christmas offering after she was on her bed of affliction, and was then very sick.

Mrs. Copeland was a member of Mt. Tabor Baptist Church, for years, and of Missionary Society also she always seemed to enjoy all the society meetings very much.

Mrs. Copeland was a daughter of Bennett and Eliza Storey, she leaves to mourn her death, one brother Mr. C. R. Storey of Murfreesboro, five sisters Mrs. Mary Carter, Mrs. H. Woodard, Mrs. James Davis of Murfreesboro, Mrs. Endie Howell of Como, Mrs. W. Whitley of Woodland, Mrs. Copeland was twice married first to Mr. Cyrus Howell of this union there is one son Mr. Jake Howell of Como, of the Copeland union there is two sons Messrs Joe and Samuel and two daughters Miss Beulah Copeland and Mrs. B. R. Dunn and two step sons Messrs Harvery and Charlie Copeland all of Murfreesboro.
