UNCONSCIOUS WHEN IS PICKED UP BY FORCE

Brought to This City and Was Attended by Dr. P. H. Mitchell, Carried to Rocky Mt.

Mr. G. C. Moore, section master of the Aulander branch of the Atlantic Coast Line railroad, was seriously and perhaps fatally injured Tuesday afternoon, when he fell from a "pump car" on which he was riding. At the time the accident happened the car was moving at good speed, and the car, helping "pump". The car besides being loaded with other members of the force contained several kegs of spikes, weighing several hundred pounds. This entire weight passed over him. The accident occurred near Earleys about the middle o fthe afternoon.

When he was picked up by other members of the force he was uncon scious. However, there was few outside signs of injury, only an abrasion here and there, the worst being a cut on the left ear. He was picked up by the local northbound freight train, and brought to Ahoskie, wher he was given medical attention, Dr. P. H. Mitchell, who attended him, stated that he found no signs of broken bones, but was unable to state definitely the extent of his injuries internally. He was taken to the Con-Line hospital at Rocky Mount on the 6 p. m. train Tuesday, at which time he was resting somewhat easier, owing to dose of morphine.
