## ROAD BONDS NOW IN HANDS OF COMPANY

All of Hertford County's road bonds are now in the possession of bonding companies. J. M. Eley, chairman, and Jno. A. Northcott, clerk, of the County Board of Commissioners, delivered the last batch to Prudden & Co., Toledo, Ohio, last week, the amount being \$200,000.

Under the terms of sale made Monday, October 16, a premium amounting to approximately \$17,000 will be realized from the bonds delivered last week. The purchasing company will pay the money for bonds in monthly installments, beginning January 1, 1924. Twenty thousand dollars will be paid in cash March 1, 1923.

Mr. Northcott says he saved the county more than \$600 by making the trip to Toledo. The saving was effected by requiring the purchasers to pay accrued interest to date, instead of paying up until the time when the contract for sale was entered into.
