### Early Scholarship Plan Set up . . .

The Chowan Association met the next month, May, 1879, at Re-vablican Church in Berlie County. On the first day of the meeting Dr. R. R. Savage made the motion that CBF Institute be made a special order for the next day at 10 clock, Elder A. D. Cohen, Wind-tor, pastor of the Republican Church, read his report on CBF Insti-tiute. Excerpts are given from the report: "During the present year the school has enjoyed almost uninterrupted good health, for which we are proualy grateful, as this enables the work done to be of a more excellent character, and established the healthfulness of the location. "The scarcity of money has diminished the usual number of pupils in attendance, yet the same faculty has been on duty, and the advantages have been concentrated on the few that would otherwise been hestowed on the many.
