Under this law, all bear some of the burden in building and repairing the public roads. The railroads and the one dispensary in the county pay about half of the road tax.

The county has a road commission, separate from the Board of Commissioners, and has ordered several road machines and mules. I will be glad to see good roads in Randolph and the first place to start for the better, is Brame's Hill, at Trinity.

Mr. John Dixon, of Alamance county writing to the Burlington News says one way to build good roads is to issue bonds and macadamize, and another is to distribute a heavy layer of a soil of a certain mixture on the roads and abandon narrow tire vehicles.

He says that we have all noticed in traveling along the roads that there are certain places that never get muddy. If the soil is examined at these places it will be found that it is a sandy mixture and suggests that this soil be hauled along the road and the bed constructed of this.

He says that South Carolina has been experimenting along this line and has found it very satisfactory.
