

THE PACKING SCANDAL

EXPOSED BEEF TRUST METHODS

Republican Party Decided the People by False Whitewashing Reports - Administration Responsible for Evils in Meat Industry - A Heated Span of Virtue.

When the president had sent his packing house message to congress, accompanied by the report of Neill and Reynolds, showing insanitary conditions and violations of law, the packers replied:

Every pound of meat in our packing houses comes from animals that are inspected and passed by trained veterinary agents of the department of agriculture. This is the absolute fact. We are not interested in animals condemned before slaughter.

This statement is true, as it may be shown either that President Roosevelt is mistaken or that his administration has been complicit in the very things he now pretends to condemn, so that his words have not been backed up by his acts. The packers' statements were verified officially by the records of the department of agriculture and the war department. In the bureau of animal industry of the agriculture department there is not a scrap of paper on the record in any way on the conduct of the packers, though hundreds of men are paid by the government of the United States to inspect all the processes and products of the packing business and see to it that none but wholesome and clean meats were allowed to be sent out of the state to consumers. This has been the case for years, and the administration, if its present charges are true, has been deceiving the people by means of false whitewashing reports ever since the Spanish war began. And it must have done so knowingly and systematically, for General Nelson A. Miles fully exposed the methods of the beef trust seven years ago and turned the evidence over to the war department. Referring to the president's sudden spasm of virtue and profound illumination on the eve of a congressional election, General Miles gave out an interview on June 4, in which he said:

"The disclosures about packing houses have been made for the first time in my life. I know you are young men and I did what I could. Had the matter been taken up at that time thousands of lives would have been saved. I have seen the records of the United States soldiers who died because of adulterated meat. It is a terrible story. There is no way of estimating the number of soldiers whose health was ruined by eating this kind of meat. I have a barrel of testimony on the subject in the way of affidavits that cover the years from 1894 to 1902. The investigation committee closed the case and refused to hear 2,000 witnesses whom I had ready to go to the front. I turned the reports over to the war department, and a whitewashing investigation was instituted and success was achieved. The official report was that a colossal error had been made. A colossal error that was a colossal fraud, and the persons who perpetrated it and were interested in it are still in the world."

Under such circumstances, the president's act in his message, whether a political feat or a confession of his own culpability, is now attacked by reason of the incompetency of the agricultural and war departments and their collusion with friends and other enemies. In either case it is evident that the administration has been on a level with the packers, which has so long been the case. The administration has professed to be a party to the scandal, but it has been a party to the scandal since the beginning.

Water Power House Was First Used in America.

Passing to a window, the speaker critic and pointed out a scene which closely parallels the history of the American nation. The view of the present chapter of our industrial development... DOCKERY DENOUNCES BUTLER.

Is it not high time the rearmory of the party were taken hold and purified? Republican politics in North Carolina? Can you do it with such a would-be leader as the gentleman whose home is in Washington City, District of Columbia, and whose office is in the bond building? Did Marion Butler ever have any principles of any sort? Did he ever say any word of a month's standing Democrat? Did he have any when he was a Republican in fashion with the Republicans? Was he sincere when he was advocating free trade when he was advocating free trade when he was advocating everything free when he was advocating government warehouses?
