once hurried to the scene and met the mob just inside the gates of the mill yards. Depaty Superintendent Mahons, in charge of the police, endeavored to pacify the mob with the warning that they would surely be beaten and many get hurt, perhaps killed, but he was run over and an entrance runde into the yards by the now infuriated mob. He at once ordered his men to "charge," and a terrific hand-to-hand fight took place which lasted about ten minutes, and in which clubs, stones and policemen's sticks were as thick as hail stones. Broken heads, noses and black eyes were too numerous to count, tut only one man was fatally injured. He was a Bohemian and refused to tell what his mme was.

A dozen or mora were locked up, though badly wounded. Two officers were badly cut about the bead and face, and nearly all the officers received bruises. The rioters dispersed in every direction, and it is now thought the lesson taught them will be so wholesome as to prevent a similar occur rence in the near future at least.

CART LOADS OF DEAD.

Saving Up the Bodies of Dead Infants to

Save Expenses. NEW YORK, July 16. -Lewis Russell, a Brooklyn undertaker, was arrested upon the presentation of the board of health of eviience that he has made a practice of storing in a cellar the bodies of infants entrusted to him for burial, keeping them on ice until he has a sufficient number on hand to make a load for a dead wagon.

The object of this irregular and revolting proceedings has been to save the costs of sev-sral trips to the cematery. The charge is made that some of the bolies became decomposed, causing a stench, and endangering public health. In one case the body was kept unburied five months.


