A BUSINESS INDEX. Weaving, at Asheville, N. C. The following are the names of the weavers, as far as they are known, and their respective localities. A CURIOSITY. Mr. G. M. Roberts brought to our office this morning one of the caterpillar family known locally as "Hickory Devil." What is the entomological name we do not know. Its appearance fully justifies its common name. It is a larva like the Bombyx of Revelations, is 4 or 5 lines high, instead of erect, recumbent, horn, each about an inch in length. The hideous dragon-like mouth is defended by similar but shorter horns. Its body is terminated by a black, curved horn. The body is divided into eight sections, over each of which passes a row of short black horns. The eight feet are long, single claws, which clasp whatever they seize with fierce tenacity. The general color is yellowish green, marked with irregular, with short broad diagonal bands. In addition to the horns and claws, the monster is defended by an exudation of poisonous liquid as terrible as a scorpion's sting. The worm is 5 inches long and 3 in circumference.
