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THE ALTERNATIVE MANDAMUS.
Great interest is felt in our county over the consideration of the injunction which was issued by Judge Gudgeon, which was heard by Judge Gudgeon at Webster this week. We published yesterday evening a telegram from Webster stating that the Judge failed to grant the injunction asked against the county commissioners of Buncombe, restraining them from levying the necessary taxes and building the fence; but instead granted an Alternative Mandamus allowing the Board of Commissioners and the chairman of the joint Board of Magistrates to convene the Magistrates and hear petitions from the townships; or to appear before him at Franklin, Macon county, on the 10th inst., and show cause why they should not be compelled to do so.
The effect of this mandamus, as we understand it, is to vest in the county commissioners on any action in the execution of the law until the question in the mandamus shall have been decided. In the meantime we learn it is the purpose of the county commissioners to appeal from the granting of the mandamus, and that the counsel for the plaintiffs reserve the right to appeal from the refusal to grant the injunction prayed for.
The order of the Judge granting the mandamus was served upon the officials to-day.
Messrs. J. H. Merrimon, Johnstone Jones and Gudgeon and Carter appear for the county commissioners, and Messrs. F. A. Sondley and M. E. Carter for the Black Mountain township. The Black Mountain township is the only township appearing in the immediate test case for any or all of the seven townships outside of the six townships embraced in the county mandamus. The plain English of the whole matter is, we believe, that the failure to obtain the injunction makes the law absolute in the entire county, notwithstanding the mandamus, unless the Magistrates shall have been convened before the first of November and shall allow Black Mountain or other townships to withdraw.
When the rail road from here to Hendersonville shall be completed a valuable industry will be opened in building and flagging stone. Vica shales and mica schists abound there, and the laminated structure gives them much of economic value. The rocks of Buncombe attainable to us are much contorted, and there is great difficulty in getting proper stone for building walks. Henderson county has an advantage, and can supply the world.

AMBASSADORS CONSULTING.
Watching Bulgaria.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 1.
The Ambassadors met to-day to consider the Roumelian question at the residence of Count Dordi, the Italian Ambassador, but adjourned without transacting any business of important nature, several of the ambassadors having not yet received instructions from their respective governments. Porte has sent circular to Powers protesting against the recent action of Prince Alexander in disarming Muzelmen in Parishes of Roumelia. Porte as a precautionary measure to prevent the reduction of supplies in event of a war with Bulgaria, has issued an order prohibiting exportation of cereals.
A Fashionable Marriage.
PARIS, October 1.
Mlle. Ena Nevada was married to-day to Dr. Raymond Palmer, of Birmingham, England. The service took place at the English Embassy, and the religious ceremonies at the Church of the Passionist Fathers. The bridemaids were Misses Morris, Johnston, Eyereth, and Sint of America. Signor Salvini Italian, tragedian, was "best man." The attendance was largely American, the English and Parisian fashionable society being well represented. The occasion was marked by much enthusiasm, and display of flowers and elegant costumes lent an air of gaiety to the scene.
AN UNRULY PRISONER.
Judge Roundtree as a Fugitive.
SANTA CRUZ, California, Oct. 1.
While Judge Roundtree was making out the commitment of John Kennedy, yesterday, the prisoner attempted to clean out the court room. He was seized by a constable, and a desperate struggle ensued. Kennedy was getting the better of the officer, when the Judge, having finished writing the commitment, descended from the Bench, and removing his coat, took a hand in the row. Judge Roundtree is noted for his physical powers, and soon succeeded in subduing the prisoner, who at the end of the fight, was in a condition of a knocked out pugilist. The Judge then rescended the Bench, and imposed an additional sentence of 30 days imprisonment on Kennedy for contempt of Court.
New York Stock Market.
NEW YORK, October 1.
New York Stock Market opened strong this morning, first prices generally being 1/2 to 1/4 per cent higher. White Union Pacific was 1/4, and New York Central 1/2 higher; but Pacific was unchanged. In early dealing continued strength was manifested and further advances of 1/4 to 1/2 per cent were made. After first fifteen minutes, however, the market reacted, and early gains were lost, but before 10:30 it again became strong and continued so until 11 o'clock. Gains ranging from 1/4 to 1/2 per cent, in which Western Union, Pacific Mail and Union Pacific were prominent. Grangers and Vanderbilts, however, were barely steady; at 11 o'clock market is active and strong. Total sales for hour 16,000 shares.
