CHAPEL HILL, N. C., Oct. 28th, 1885. Many of the peach, plum and cherry trees at this place are infested with a minute, cylindrical beetle, of a dark brown color, about 1 16 and 1 10 inches in length, and 1 25 inches, in diameter. Observations made upon a number of of them are affected more or less, some very badly; while as a rule every dead peach tree shows marks of their having

been present. During the fall of the year the female beetle bores a cylindrical hole in the bark just large enough to permit of her passing into it. The hole is from 1 to 1 called the "main gallery," the beetle deposits a few eggs, and usually retreats to that Mrs. Armstrong allowed her daughter the entrance where she remains blocksects from destroying her eggs, or young. Many times she remains here to die, and soon being attacked by a fungus growth completely blocks the entrance even in death. When the eggs hatch the young larvae, or grubs, begin to feed upon the with the increasing size of the borer.

Entomologists call this beetle Phloeotribus liminaris (Harris.) About five years ago quite a scare existed among the peach growers in parts of the State of New York because of the damage done by this insect. Whole crchards were destroyed. It was estimated that it required about two to-three years for these beetles to kill a tree when once at-

I wish to call the attention of the fruit growers of the State, or any one interested in the subject, to this matter, that it

from his experience with other borers of this family, feels "satisfied that a good coating of a mixture of lime, sulphur and paris green will protect a heathy tree that is not yet attacked as long as the

coating lasts." A coating of gas tar was suggested by one who had used it with perfe in destroying other borers. From my own observations aggest in addition to the above remedies, the cutting down and burning all badly infested trees or limbs. The custom, generally supposed to be economic, of using dead portions of fruit trees for "pea brush," I regard as pernicious. It would be safer, and far cheaper in the end to obtain healthy brush from forest

I should esteem any information from different sections of the State in regard to the extent and injuries of this insect great favor.
