THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION
The Senatorial District was held in the Court House here yesterday. The result was somewhat surprising. Mr. Lusk's nomination had been accepted as a foregone conclusion. He was unexpectedly disappointed. Madison county was fully represented. In Buncombe, Black Mountain, Fair View, Jamestown and Avery's Creek townships were not represented. The voting was on the aggregated county Republican vote. Mr. Jacob Fox received the vote of Madison county, amounting to 1,827 votes. Mr. Lusk received 1,172 votes, adding the votes of the township not represented, he would have received 1,573 votes.

PROPERTY OWNERS here look upon the business of keeping boarders as one which promises the city a rapid growth, and I think they are justified in doing so. When Asheville had no roads, and the accommodations were poor compared with what they are now, the natural attractions of the place drew many sojourners. As might have been expected, every advance in accessibility has been followed by an increase in the number of hotels and boarding houses. The Battery Park Hotel was completed and opened in July of this year, and has been practically full down to the present time. For weeks many guests were turned away every day. The house now has capacity for about 300 guests, 75 rooms are to be added to it immediately. It stands on the highest ground in the city and commands a magnificent prospect. The charges are from \$15 to \$25 per week, while those at excellent private boarding houses are about \$30 per month. The proprietors of the Battery Park are going to try the experiment of keeping open throughout the year.
