The steam passes through the mass of bruised roots and is condensed by the tin tube in-to a mixture of distilled water and oil, and runs into glass vessels set to receive it. Being of different densi-ties, the oil and water rapidly settle into two strata, and one can be decanted from the other.

It is said that the operator of such a "still" can pay all running expenses and make a clear profit of \$3 per day. When we consider that the cost of establishing such a "factory" is less than \$10 for the entire plant, and no chemical education is necessary on the part of the opera-tor, the profit of the work is not to be despised.


