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LATEST NEWS.

A New Ohio Idea. FINDLAY, O., January 30.—Clarissa Jackson, a colored woman living in Delaware Township, this county, yesterday became a grandmother at the early age of twenty-five years. Mrs. Jackson, who is a comely little colored woman, was married when but eleven years old and in her twelfth year gave birth to a daughter. This daughter, imitating the example of her mother, married a man named Hawkins when twelve years old, gave birth also to a daughter, who, like her mother, was twelve years old when she was married. This is the second case of the kind that ever happened in this county, the other having taken place about thirty-five years ago and the party sold brought 25 cents.

The Duke of Newcastle will winter in Florida and pay a flying visit to Philadelphia. He is young, unmarried and has a work leg. Louis Kessuth, now well on his 86th year, is in capital health of mind and body, and constantly busies himself with literary work. Samuel Spencer, who has been made president of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad at a salary of \$25,000 a year, was a peddler earning a scant salary a few years ago. He is not yet 40 years old.

John B. Alley, of Massachusetts is said to be worth considerably over \$10,000,000. He is the richest Republican in the old Bay State and is fond of politics. The greater part of his fortune was made in speculation and he is constantly adding to it. Mr. Alley is 70 years old. The Prince of Wales was slightly wounded in the nose by a Swedish nobleman, Baron Oscar Dickson, while shooting at Sandringham, but the incident was considered much too trifling to prevent either his royal majesty or Col. Ellis, the other guest who was slightly shot, from continuing to shoot the rest of the day.

Fire broke out in the hospital for the mangled and crippled at the corner of Lexington avenue and 124th street this evening. The hospital contained 163 crippled children, and the fire, which was caused by a gas stove, did not get under control until the extent of \$2,500 before the flames were gotten under control.

Mr. Hatch, of Missouri, called up the bill making provision for agricultural experiment stations and the senate amendments were concurred in. Mr. Breckenridge, of Arkansas, introduced and had referred to the ways and means committee the Hewitt administrative tariff bill. The House then at 4-25, adjourned.

Terrible Fire in New York. New York, January 30.—One of the largest fires that has occurred in this city for many months broke out in the store of Henry Rogers & Co., 547 Broadway, early this morning. It extended to and destroyed the five adjoining stores. The property occupies the west side of Broadway, between Prince and Spring streets, and extends the night to Mercer street. Insurance men estimate the loss at \$1,500,000. Fireman Reilly died at noon from his injuries. But little can be learned of individual losses. Veit & Sons estimate their loss at \$300,000, with \$150,000 insurance. The stocks of Malcomer & Co and Chas. A. Vest & Co. were destroyed. Buildings destroyed were valued at \$500,000, and on these insurance was compar-
