THE EDITOR OF THE BALTIMORE "SUN" DEAD.

A telegraph bulletin spread to the public yesterday afternoon by the Sun office, announces the death of the venerable Mr. Abell of the Baltimore Sun which occurred yesterday morning. The deceased was in his 82nd year.

For more than half a century the Baltimore Sun has been a household companion in the city in which it is published, and looked for far and wide throughout the United States.

The Sun was founded by Mr. Abell in May, 1838, and had been conducted continuously by him until his death.

Another Mountain Enterprise. The following from the Wilmington Messenger indicates a movement in a section of remarkable beauty, great fertility, and admirable a laptitude to certain industries.

The Linville—not Louville, as the Messenger has it—is a river remarkable for its varied characteristics and striking contrasts. Above the falls it runs through a flat valley which spreads out, almost on the very top of the Blue Ridge to the breadth of a mile or more.

Just below the stupendous mass known as the Short-off, the pent up stream emerges from its imprisonment into the valley of the Catawba, and thence to its union with that river resumes its first character as a clear, swift and beautiful mountain river whose sparkling current is approachable with facility.

We are not familiar with the location of the site selected for a new town; but we feel assured from our knowledge of the general features of the section that good judgment has been exercised; and that no long time will elapse before the town of Linville will be known as the centre of industry, and also as a very fascinating summer resort.

The Linville Land, Manufacturing and Mining Company was organized on the 14th inst. at Cranberry, N. C., under the management of the following officers: Donald McKee, of Wilmington, president; S. T. Kelly, of Highlands, vice president and general manager; C. E. Ricksecker, of Hutchison, Kan., secretary, and Wallace Hahn, of Cranberry, Thos. F. Parker, of Charleston, and H. W. Brundige, of Horton, Kan., directors.

Congress and took his seat in 1859. He was re-elected in 1860. In 1862 he was defeated by his old law partner, Francis Keenan, but the succeeding election he in turn defeated Keenan.

It was in the House that the famous passage between himself and Blaine, for whom he had a contempt, occurred, and their antagonism was never reconciled.

He was re-elected in 1866, but in 1867, before he took his seat, he was chosen United States senator, and returned in 1873 and 1879.

Mr. Conkling supported Grant's administration, and largely directed its general policy. He was instrumental in the passage of the Civil Rights bill and favored resumption of specie payments.

At Cincinnati in 1876 Mr. Conkling received ninety-three votes for the republican nomination for President. In the Chicago convention in 1880 he advocated the nomination of Grant for a third term.

The end of his political career in 1881, when he became hostile to Garfield over the matter of New York patronage, and resigned his office to seek a vindication for his appointment at the hands of the Legislature. In 1882 he failed through the efforts of Blaine, and at once declared his political career ended. He then returned upon the practice of law.

Since then he had been employed in many important cases, being regarded as one of the best lawyers of his day, his fee never being less than \$5,000.

His personal character was considered good and he was not considered in those lands in which other leading men of his party were implicated.

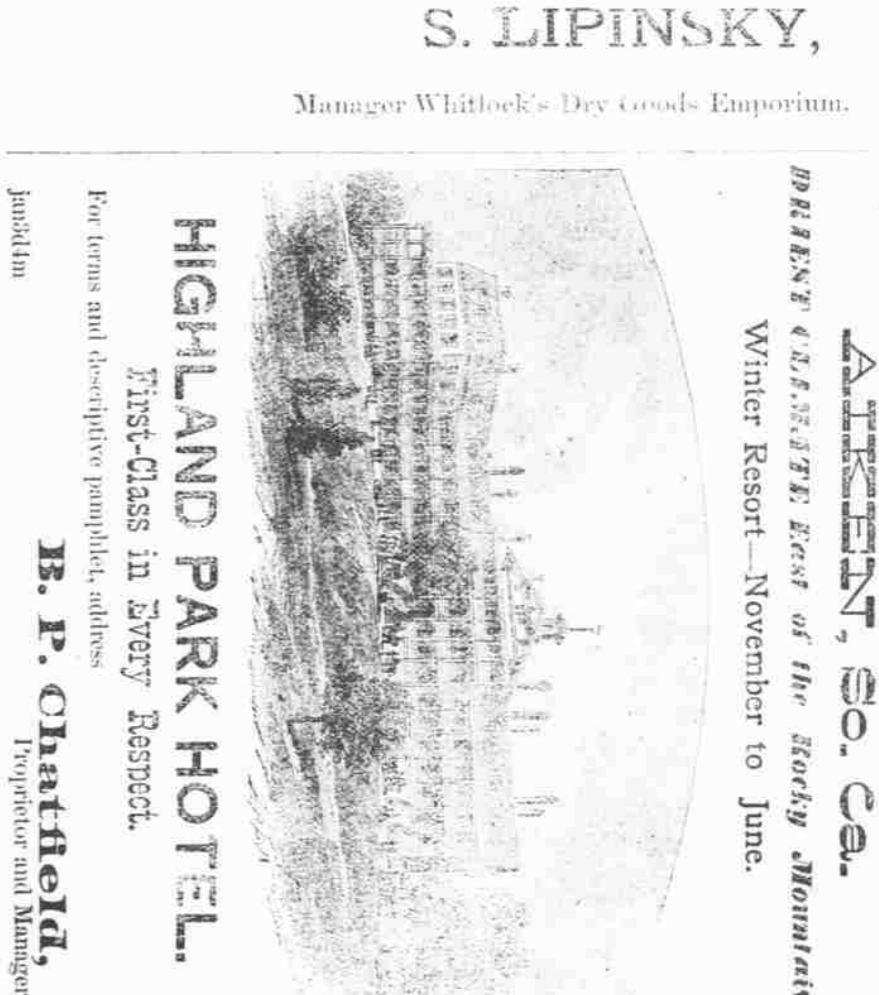
