During the excitement pending the ascertaing by the alternate freeze and thaw of our somewhat variable winter. of the result of the election in New York in 1884, Mr. Blaine told his friends "to claim everything." On the day following the recent election in Maine, this distinguished claimant hastened "to claim everything" and telegraphed Gen. Harrison the republicans had carried the State by a larger majority than for twenty years. Now that all the returns are in, the republican vote of the State only increased 1824 or .023 per cent over the vote of 1884, while the democratic increase was 3038 or .052 per cent. The pluralities however, show a reduction this year as compared with the votes of 1884. The republican plurality this year is 18,495. In September 1874 it was 19709, and in November of the same year Mr. Blaine's plurality was 20060. This does not look like the people are so thoroughly opposed to tariff reform and a reduction of taxation.
