A NEW INDUSTRY
FOR THE MANUFACTURE OF TASTELESS QUININE
To be Established in This City and Operations to Begin Within a Few Months.

A new and big industry is to be established here within a few months and one that will greatly enhance the business interests of this city and the advantages of Asheville as a manufacturing center.

Mr. E. W. Grove, president of the Paris Medicine company with headquarters at St. Louis, who has taken the A. J. Lyman house, corner Merrimon avenue and Chestnut street, is now making arrangements to open a branch house here for the manufacture of tasteless quinine and expects to begin operations by the first of the year. The preparation to be manufactured is a very recent discovery, having been perfected only about six months ago, after twenty-three years of experimental work. The Paris Medicine company is an old firm and are manufacturers of the well known laxative bromo quinine. Among the other preparations manufactured by this company are Grove's tasteless chills, tasteless quinine preparations and Febriline or tasteless syrups of quinine.

Mr. Grove's company declares a dividend of twenty five per cent. every three months. It has a paid in capital stock of \$76,800 and a surplus (January, 1897) of \$144,719.25. There are a large number of branch houses throughout the United States established for the purpose of handling these medicines. These special departments in this section are Norfolk, Richmond and Goldsboro.

Mr. Grove has taken offices in the Maxwellton, which he will at once equip for special experimental work preparatory to opening his manufacturing industry the first of the year.

THE HILLIARD-GILMER CASE.

Argument of a Motion Before Judge Ewart.

A motion in the important case of Hilliard against Gilmer, from Haywood county, was argued by appointment before Judge Ewart yesterday afternoon, beginning at 3:30 o'clock. At nightfall a recess was taken until 8:30, at the Swannanoa hotel, at which time a further continuance was ordered until Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The motion was for the removal of R. D. Gilmer, as trustee, and for the appointment of a receiver.

Many prominent Haywood county citizens are here as witnesses and interested parties, among them being Clerk J. K. Boone, W. W. Stringfield and L. M. Welch.

The case is one of more than ordinary interest, involving, as it does, the distribution of the assets of an estate valued at about \$250,000. The property is what is known as the Love estate, located in the counties of Haywood, Jackson and Swain. For several years past there has been a dissension among the distributees, some of whom reside in Asheville.

On the death of James R. Love, his son-in-law, the late Dr. W. L. Hilliard, qualified as administrator. He entered upon his duties, but before having completed them, he died. Thereupon, R. D. Gilmer, the defendant, was appointed administrator cum testamento annexo de bonis non, and also trustee, and has acted as such since 1891.

Mrs. M. E. Hilliard and those who join her in the suit, are applying for the removal of Mr. Gilmer, and as reasons therefor, allege mismanagement, incompetency a failure to make reports; and allege that a vast sum of money has come into Mr. Gilmer's hands as administrator and trustee, which has not been properly accounted for.

The defendant in his answer denies each and every one of these allegations, and says that he has vouchers and other evidences that he has honestly and faithfully discharged the duties imposed upon him. Mr. Gilmer insisted upon a conclusion of the case last night, but this was impracticable under the circumstances, hence the postponement.

The plaintiff is represented by T. H. Cobb, Esq., and G. S. Ferguson; and the defendant by Avery and Webb, and Hon. W. T. Crawford.

Judge Ewart declined to proceed with the hearing of the affidavits for the reason that it was necessary for him to leave on the midnight train in order to reach Hendersonville today where he will hear an important injunction suit.

At the funeral services of Mrs. A. Brandt at the Catholic church at 9 a. m. this morning the requiem of high mass will be had. The choir will be composed of Misses Gleason and Bradley, Mrs. Riley and John Fisher.
