BEEF RAISERS

Forming a National Organization in Denver.

First Gathering of the Cattle Men of the United States.

One of the Features of the Assemblage Will be a Monster Buffalo Barbecue Uniform Quaractine Laws.

Denver, Jan. 24.-An organization will be formed here to-morrow, which will have an important influence on the future development not only of Denver, but of the whole west. The people of this city for some months have been looking forward with great interest to the formation of a National Cattle Growers' association. Over five thousand delegates, representing the whole cattle raising and live stock business of the United States will be in attendance. Besides a number of the governors of different states will be present and other persome who directly or indirectly have some of buffalo meat, bears', meat, antelope

the cattle men of the north and south are using Denver as a market for snipment to the eastern markets. It was nocked b, the railroads that Lenver was used by the traders as a cattle centre and an arragement known as the seed and transit as rangement was made, which allows the Lenver, to unload their castle at their farms in Nebraska, Montana or Kansas. By this arrangement traders can take their cattle to their respective ranches for fatenung, keep them there for three or five months and then send them back on the same bill of lading to Denver. Heretofore the stock man from Montana was compelled to look for young cattle in Texas New Mexico and Arizona, orten spenain a half a year in a journey south for the purpose. If instead, he could come to Denver during the trading season, he would meet the southern raisers and make his purchases, which would be of great advantage to both the seller and the buyer. If Denver becomes the cattle trade centre, it will greatly aid the cattle business of the south. Now the breeders make no attempt to put the catale raised in the south on the market because these are extremely lean and need fattening before being butchered. The cattle were loaded on the caltle cars in the breeding states and carried to such centres of the trade market as Cansas City and Omaha. Then the catle men known as the feeders would buy his five hundred or five thousand heads of cattle, ship them to his canch in Kansas or Nebraska and after they had been fattened cend them once more back to the entres of the cattle industry, at a second expense. Now the cattle breeders of the outhern sates can bring their cattle to lenver and from there bring them to the rich and verdant pastures of the western states and after the stock has been fattened carry it back to be sold on the mar-One of the big features of the gathering

will be the grand barbecue to be held or the last day of the convention. A menu

The Hon. Alva Adams, governor of Colorada, will call the convention to order, -after which the delegates will elect their permanent officers. The vice-presidents of the convention will be the governors of all states and territories. Every state and territory will be represented by one delegate, and the different cattle, horse, sheep and swine breeders' associations will be represented by one delegate for every 10,000 head of stock raised by such organization.

Besides forming a national organization, the best means and methods for the development of the cattle and stock industry will be extensively discussed. Papers will also be read on the following subjects during the convention:

"Adoption of more uniform state and national quarantine laws, the railroad versus the trail in the movement of stock, lAmerican horses in the armies of Europe, diseases of live s ock and their remedy, the ceding of arid lands to the states, the sheep industry and best methods to eradicate the scab, tariff on hides, branding stock, the

protection of the range industry, the eastern breeders of fine stock and their relations to the Western range men, the movement of cattle from south to north, the lamb feeding industry in the west, shipment, of American stock and meats to European markets, the future of horse breeding in the United States and the enactment of laws governing brands. Prof. Peters, of the University of Nebraska, will read a paper on "The advances made in combating contagious diseases to-day." The subject of irrigation will also receive attention at some session of the conven-

The main reason why the new organization will meet in this city is because Denver is again becoming the centre of the cattle business, which it occupied in forthe trade here has again been revived and has assumed remarkable proportions. The trause of the increase is due to the fact that

steaks and venisons of all kinds will be served. A mammoth circus tent, capable of holding 10,000 people has been secured in the day the festival is given.

Curator Ferill, of the State Historical soclety, has applied for the heads and hides of the buffaloes that will be slaughtered for the feast. Ten big buffalo have been groomed at the Union stock yards for this event. Any one wishing a good meal on bhat day can satisfy his desire by attending the barbecue.

The convention which meets here is not the first meeting of the cattlemen of the United States. In 1885, at the great cattle growers' convention held in St. Louis, the plan of forming a national association was proposed, but the rivalry that existed between the Chicago and St. Louis commission men prevented the formation of a permanent organization.

In Austria this monster is very terrible in appearance, going about with clanking chains and hideous devil's mask. He is frequently heard at night as he flies through the air, and his rattling chains

are giving notice of his presence. In many places there is the belief that wolves roam the earth on the night before Christmas and create great havoc in destroying vines and other property and even human beings. This belief has made an excuse for a means of mischievous frolic. Men and boys frequently disguise themselves as wolves and go about frightening the people. - Chicago Times-Herald.
