Yesterday's Fluctuations on the Exchanges.

Quotations of the New York Money Market-Chicago Grain and Live Stock-Country Produce.

New York, March 16.—After an extremely dull session cotton closed to-day at about the same as it closed last night. There were no developments of importance in the political situation. Liverpool was rather favorable this morning. That market advanced one-half to one sixty-fourth. Prices here opened unchanged, later declined somewhat on moderate short and then recovered the loss, on reports from the south of the presence of an excellent spot demand in that morket. August opened at 6.06, rallied to 6.08, declined to 6.03, advanced to 6.07 and closed at 6.06 to 6.07, with the tone of the market steady. The demand in the south is too good to justify the contention of the bears that the trade of the world is fully supplied and unless depressed by outside influences the market will probably go higher.

A FATAL FIRE

Four Persons Dead and Fifteen Mis- Moses Wilson a Yancer County Crim-

Chicago, March 16 .- Four are dead and direct missing as a result of the fire that destroyed the big music building at 215 Wabash avenue today.

Three hundred girls were employed in the building, mostly on the fifth and sixth floors. When the fire broke out a panic ensued, many of the unfertunate women being trampled under the feet of their comrades in their frantic efforts to escape. Cut off from escape by the elevators and stallrways the people penned in the burning building began jumping from the windows, and, though the firemen and others held nets and canvas, many were crushed on the stone sidewalks.

The walls of the building caved in within half an hour after the fire started, and it is believed that several of the fifteen persons who are missing were buried in the blazing rules.

DEFIED THE JUDGE

Jury Refused to Indict an Original Package Dealer.

Columbia, S. C., March 16.-Judge D. A. Townsend, who refused to recognize the decision of the United States courts on the legality of the original package law, caused a sensation at Edgefield today. McNamara, the original package dealer, was charged with selling liquor and keeping a disorderly store. The grand jury returned "No bill." Townsend thereupon declared that none but state dispensaries had a legal right to sell liquor in the state and ordered the grand jury to find a true bill. The body flatly refused to obey the order.

A DESPERADO CAPTURED

inal now in Jail.

In company with Depuity Marshall J. H. Bradshaw, Sheriff Huskins, S. Peterson and others, Mr. Roland succeeded in capturing Moses Wilson, who is charged in Yancey county with the murder of Joseph Tipton on Jack's Creek several months ago, an account of which was published in the Gazetite at the time. Wilson is a notorious blockader, and of a bad character generally. For years he has been a terror to Phone 78. the people of Yancey county, being regarded as a more desperate character even than George McCurry, Immediately after the murder, and before officers could reach the scene Wilson skipped the country, and in spite of the efforts made to capture him has managed to evade the law until now. When found he was at the house of Moses Peterson on Jack's Creek, near a large still, which it is thought he was running clandestinely. I This fact was communicated to the officers and the raid made.

The officers hearing of Wilson's whereabouts surrounded the house and demanded his surrender. No resistance was made and the posses entered the house and seized their prisoner.

Wilson told the officers that since the murder he had been hiding in Tennessee and Kenitucky iHe was handcuffed and taken to Burnsville jail, where he will remain until his trial, which will probably be at the next term of the court, which meets in May.

The county of Yancey is to be congratuated upon the capture and incarceration of three of the most desperate oriminals that ever intested that or any other county in North Carolina, to wit, George Mc-Curry, Mack Webb and Moses Wilson, and the officers of the law are embitted to much credit for the diligent manner in which they have done their work in making the arrests. The people of Yancey county are determined to see that these desperadoes are properly punished.
