Populist State Convention to be Held May 17.

School Election to Take Place on June 14.

Raleigh, April 7.—Everybody was all excitement yesterday when the bulletin boards and the newspaper extras gave the news that General Lee left Havana for Key West.

The weather bureau predicted another heavy frost last night.

On Easter Sunday at the Church of the Good Shepherd a memorial to Mrs. W. M. Clarke, the wife of one of the rectors of the church, is to be presented.
