Jag last night. The Raleigh fire department is almost entirely a voluntary one. There are 110 Gremen here and only 11 of these receive a penny. There are four fire companies here, three white and one colored. The 11 paid firemen are the drivers and the watchmen at the different fire department houses. The valuation of the property of the department is \$30,200. The expenditure for the department for the past year has been \$7,543.54. The water supply is from 124 public and 15 private double-nozzle 21/2such fire hydrants. The water pressure is from 50 to 75 pounds, throws pressure according to location, with a direct pressure when necessary of from 85 to 115 pounds. We better fire department, either paid or voluntary, can be found anywhere. All the department's buildings are thoroughly up-to-date. There are three two-horse hose wagons, each carrying 1,000 feet of rubber-lined hose, one hook and ladder truck, one Gould steamer, 800 feet of hose an reserve and 8 splendid horses.


