MOUNTAIN RETREAT.

The Coming Assembly, Near Black Mountain.

The second summer Southern Assembly will be held at Mountain Retreat near Black Mountain, August 16, to August 30. The retreat is fifteen miles east of Asheville, amid beautiful mountain scenery. The program of the assembly this year will be similar to the usual program of International Christian Workers' convention. It will be thoroughly interesting and practical, and it may safely be said that there will not be a dull hour during the assembly.
The singing will be in charge of Rev. F. M. Lamb of Kennebunkport, Maine, and Mr. E. L. Bowyer of Cleveland. Among the speakers will be H. B. Gibbud of Springfield, Mass., Weston R. Gales of Roanoke, Va., Rev. R. A. Torrey of Chicago, Ill., H. J. Gillette, City Evangelist of Hartford, Conn., Capt. H. T. Fisher, Cleveland, Ohio, C. A. Rowland, Jr. of Athens, Ga., Rev. O. C. Weller and many others.

It is expected one day will be given to foreign missionary work, and as there are several returned missionaries living at Mountain Retreat it is believed that the day will be extremely profitable and interesting. Accommodations at Mountain Retreat will be in small cottages, shacks, tents and Adirondack camps. Meals can be obtained in the association's dining room, charges being 25 cents for breakfast or supper and 35 cents for dinner, lodging \$1.00 a day, or \$5.00 a week. A special rate is provided for members of the International Christian Workers' association and for lot holders.

Persons who wish to erect their own tent or camp, who are not lot holders, can do so on payment to Mountain Retreat association of 50 cents for each tent for the fifteen days of assembly or less time. If tent is occupied for longer time or one month, the charge will be \$1.00 a month in addition to 50 cents for permit. All such persons will occupy tents subject to the rules of Mountain Retreat association and permit is subject to be revoked for any good reason. Lot-holders of course, can erect tents without charge, in place designated, subject to rules.
Fire-wood for carping parties will be furnished free. It is believed ample and comfortable accommodations can be provided for between 200 to 300 persons.

St. Louis, July 25.—H. C. Schoppe & Sons, St. Louis commission merchants, got an order today for fifteen carloads of Irish potatoes to be shipped to Santiago for the United States government.
