GENERAL MARKET IN SYMPATHY

The Grangers and Industrial Stocks Most Prominent in the Upward Movement

Cotton Continues Very Strong and Steady--Wheat Weak and Lower; Corn and Provisions Easier on Heavy Receipts.

New York, Feb. 18.--The Grangers, with Burlington as a leader, were the strong features today. Trading in Rock Island and St. Paul was very active particularly in the latter stock. All standard issues were in strong demand and interest was remarkably well distributed, particularly for a Saturday market.

Manhattan was depressed early in the day on rumors that the city authorities would force the company to remove its structures in certain parts of the city. It, however, recovered its loss later in the day and closed firm.

The industrials were firm, particularly Sugar Refining, Federal Steel and Wire. American Tobacco advanced rapidly from the opening on the rumored purchase of the Liggett & Meyers plant.

Throughout the week there has been continuous liquidation of securities for European account, both in the visible operations on the stock exchange and in the invisible sales made by bankers to other banks and to individuals over the country. The stability of the stock market will be bettered by the reabsorption of foreign securities.

Money lenders complain of the difficulties experienced here and in other cities of disposing of their funds.

We are bullish and advise purchases on recessions. The bank statement was not unsatisfactory.

COTTON--Although late cables came higher and closed about 2 points up,

their advance was not up to spot prices here. Our opening was higher and prices very firm and the market steadily improved throughout the day, the close being around top prices.

Moderate orders from the south, together with a noticeably less disposition to sell were factors. Port receipts for the week are estimated at 90,000. The coming visible in sight is expected to reach 125,000. These figures are based on the rising temperature in the south. Unless the receipts increase rapidly in the future, Europeans may lower crop estimates and cover by sales in this market. This we consider as more than a likely contingency and we repeat our advice of this week, buy on all recessions.

Chicago, Feb. 18.--Wheat has ruled easy today both here and abroad. Liquidation set in and an indisposition to buy evinced by the Europeans were the principal factors. Receipts continued larger than a year ago and other exporting countries are competing with the Americans in supplying the foreign demand.

We have put ourselves on record this week as being bearish on the situation and have given various reasons, and find our position sustained by the course of the market.

We repeat our advice to sell on all good bulges.

Receipts of corn and oats are heavy, and this shows its effect in prices. Provisions suffered today from heavy liquidation and large receipts, and as we frequently have said, we see nothing to buy them on.
