BUNCOMBE'S ONLY MACADAMIZED ROAD

Progress of the Work Being Done by

Convicts North of Asheville. Dr. I. A. Harris, the county physi cian, returned yesterday from a visit to one of the convict camps. The condi tion of the roads and weather has prevented much road work lately. Dr. Harris speaks of the terrible condition of the county roads, especially the Burnsville road, excepting the part that is being macadamized. The macadam work has now been extended about one mile and three quanters from the city limits. The old board (Caney Brown's) carried the work from the city bound ary to the creek, and the new board has gone on beyond the creek. The stone for the macadamizing is obtained right alongside the road. The new quarry on the Woodfin farm between the creek and the Burnsville hill produces good solid stone for the work, a great im provement on the first stone used on the road. The convicts have been at work on this first attempt at macadam izing Buresville's roads since last October but the slowness of their progress is due somewhat to the season in which the work has been undertaken. It is a great relief to farm ers coming to town to strike the hard macadam of the completed stretch of road after the terrible river of mud that execends beyond it both north and

HOT WATER WELLS. Some Cases Temperature Rises Twenty Degrees in a Single Night -Cause of the Phenomenon.

The wells in parts of Arizona have recently become producers of hot water, and apprehension is felt by many of the residents of the region affected that they are about to become participants in a grand volcanic drama. In some of the wells the temperature of the well water rose 20 degrees in a single night. In a few the phenomenon disappeared soon after its appearance. In a majority of the cases, however, the wells fairly steam from their newly-acquired heat. The first known of this curious state of affairs was a report that the wells at Maricopa, on the Southern Pacific railroad, 30 miles south of Phoenix, had suddenly become hot, says the Omaha Bee.

It was four days thereafter that the phenomenon first was noticed a dozen miles west of that city. A test at one well showed a temperature of nearly 100 degrees. No difference is noted in wells in the immediate vicinity of Phoenix.

The line of subterranean heat wave follows the general direction of the Sierra Estrella mountains, a volcanic chain lying immediately south of the Gilariver. Thence it appears to continue on in the direction of the Harqua Hala mountains, near which are a number of large and modern volcanic cones and hills of drifted volcanic ash. Further to the east the lava flows are so geologcally modern as to have overwhelmed in a number of places the cliff dwellings of the ancients.
