EVIDENCE

COMPLETED

In the Case of Mrs. George--
Disagreement Looked For,

Canton, Ohio, April 22.—The testimony in the case of Mrs. George, who is on trial on the charge of killing George D. Saxton, was completed today, and the case will go to the jury Wednesday. A disagreement of the jury is looked for. The state has proven the motive for the crime, and has traced Mrs. George to a point near the crime, very near the time of its commission. It has forged a chain of circumstances her with the crime, and has produced one witness who claims he actually saw her kill Saxton. The defense has entered a general denial and presented a theory of an unknown man committing the crime, and has produced a partial alibi.

TROUBLE MAKERS

'Seditious and Treasonable Telegrams' Sent Troops.

General Otis Confirms Suspicions of Officers of Administration.

A Concerted Movement to Prevent Retention of Philippines.

Government Will Expose Plot, With Names, or Punish Offenders—No More News of Movements of Troops.

Washington, April 22.—The officers of the administration are indignant, and even bitter, toward the plotters who are endeavoring to cause dissatisfaction among the troops in the Philippines. General Otis has confirmed the suspicions of the officials in a despatch in which he says, explaining the dissatisfaction among the volunteers, that a number of "seditious and treasonable telegrams" were received at Manila from the United States for distribution among the troops.

Otis has been asked to send the names of those who signed the telegrams. A cabinet officer's authority for the statement that there is a concerted movement to prevent, by underhand and treasonable means, the retention of the Philippines. It is the intention of the government to make a public exposure of the plot with the names of those concerned, when all the details are obtained. This intention may be changed to a determination to proceed against the plotters with a view of punishing them.

Otis sent a message today, outlining the movement of Lawton's column, which began this morning to the north of Novaliches. It is understood that Lawton will work in conjunction with MacArthur's column at Malolos and vicinity, the plan being to drive the rebels into the mountains. The war department declines to make public any information on the ground that the movement might not be successful. It is apparent that the department believes that Otis' dispatches are being sent back to the Philippines for the information of the rebels.

ARMY LISTS EXAGGERATED

Show 39,930 Cubans Entitled to Pay—Gomez Will Investigate.

Havana, April 22.—General Gomez called on General Brooke this afternoon to confer with him regarding the disbandment of the Cuban army. General Brooke said the total army, as indicated by the lists, must be reduced, as he had received trustworthy information that the number was greatly exaggerated. The lists show 39,930 men that are entitled to pay. General Gomez will investigate the matter.

MORGAN LINER SUNK

Morgan Line Boat Goes Down—Twelve Reported Drowned.

New Orleans, April 22.—A despatch received here this afternoon said the steamer General Whitney has been sunk fifty miles east of Cape Canaveral, on the Florida coast. Twelve men, including the captain, are reported to have been drowned and fifteen are still missing. The General Whitney left this port for New York Tuesday. She was an extra freighter on the Morgan line.

EXTREME MEASURES BY MAZET COMMITTEE

Will Prosecute Witnesses Who Refuse to Answer.

New York, April 22.—At today's session of the Mazet investigating committee Proctor Clarke, assistant counsel of the committee, called attention to the penal code which provides for a year's imprisonment or a fine of \$500 or both for refusing to answer questions propounded by a committee of the legislature. It is the purpose of the committee's counsel to put contumacious witnesses who refused to answer proper questions as the committee shall determine, to the constituted criminal authorities of this county for presentment, indictment and punishment.

CONCESSION FOR CUBAN RAILWAY

Greenwood Claims It Was Granted Before Proclamation Was Issued.

Havana, April 22.—General Greenwood is vigorously prosecuting his claim for a franchise to build the Central Cuban railway. He claims he got a concession from the Spanish and American authorities immediately after the capitulation of Santiago, and before the proclamation forbidding the granting of franchises had been issued. He refused to say from whom the concession came, but it is understood he received the American rights from General Wood.

General Greenwood conferred with Gomez about the scheme today. Gomez offered thousands of Cuban soldiers to push the work, and this feature of the plan finds favor with the people.

THREE KILLED ONE INJURED

Train Strikes a Party Walking on the Track.

Baraboo, Wis., April 22.—Two young women and one man were killed and another man injured by the Chicago and Northwestern train early this morning. The four were returning on the tracks from a party at a neighbor's house.

REPRESENTATIVE BAIRD DEAD

A Prominent Louisiana Democrat Passed Away at Washington.

Washington, April 22.—Representative Baird, of Bastrop, La., died here this afternoon after two months' illness. For many years he has been prominent in Louisiana politics, and was elected to the Fifty-fifth congress. He was a democrat.

SUICIDE OF COL. M. L. CLARK

Memphis, April 22.—Colonel M. Lewis Clark, of Louisville, a well known racing judge committed suicide this morning in a room in a hotel. Clark had been indisposed for several days, and his physician diagnosed his case as melancholia. About 9 o'clock the sharp crack of a pistol was heard by guests passing through the hall. Attaches of the hotel were summoned and the door of Clark's room was forced open. Clark lay across the foot of the bed with a smoking revolver clutched tightly in his hand. The bullet had entered the right temple and he was dead.

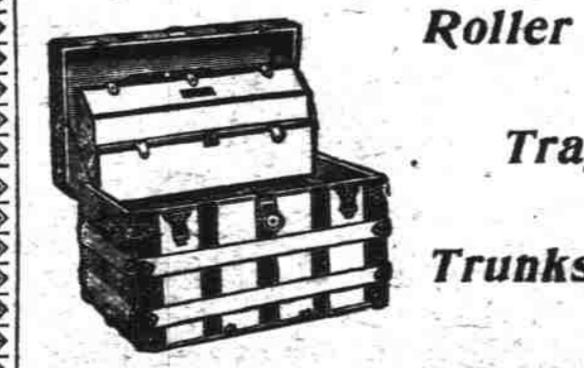

JURY OUT 22 HOURS

No Agreement Reached on Lake City Lynching.

Final Count Showed Five Holding Out for Acquittal.

Defendants Furnished Bonds for Appearance in November.

Judge Said that Whites Should be Able to Govern the State without Resorting to Mob Rule.

Charleston, S. C., April 22.—After being out twenty-two hours the jury in the Lake City lynching case this morning announced that no agreement could be reached, the final count showing five members hanging out for acquittal. The eight defendants are required to furnish new bonds for their appearance in November. Before dismissing the jury, Judge Brawley spoke on the lynching fever which has prevailed in the state. He said that this was a white man's state, and if the whites, with all the machinery of the law at their command, were unable to rule the state without resorting to mob rule, it was time to confess their weakness and incapacity to govern.

WHERE RESPONSIBILITY RESTS

London, April 22.—John Barrett, the American ex-minister to Siam, who lately returned from Manila, says there can be no doubt but that the greatest responsibility for the prolongation of hostilities rests on those who encourage the insurgents to believe that if they hold out long enough, public sentiment in America will change and the islands will receive independence. The insurgent junta at Hon Kong has complete information from day to day as to the drift of American opinion, and their sole encouragement is the belief that within a year public opinion will change. If this moral support is withdrawn, no attempt will be made to resume hostilities after the rainy season.

PRESBYTERIAN MEETING.

Millis River, N. C., April 22.—The popular meeting in the interest of home missions was an interesting service. Ten minute talks were made by the moderator, Elder J. D. Murphy, Licentiate L. E. Boston, and Revs. J. L. Wicker, and S. C. Caldwell. After the meeting the remaining business of the session was transacted and Asheville Presbytery adjourned to meet in Hendersonville May 3d at 10 a. m.. The next regular meeting will be at Dillsboro, September 14th. The attendance on the meetings of the Presbytery by the community was very gratifying. The farmers were very busy, yet good congregations were present every service. Rev. J. T. Wade preached last night from the text: "And his name shall be called wonderful." Rev. E. Mac Davis will remain and preach Sunday morning at 11 a. m.
