A most peculiar accident happened to a freight train Tuesday just below Mt. Rose. The train was coming in this direction, when just before reaching a cut, a box car in the middle of the train broke loose, jumped the track and toppled over the bank. No other car left track, and the front half of the train was backed, coupled to the rear and proceeded up the mountain. On Thursday, as a wrecking train was raising the overturned car, the chain broke, striking Tom Jackson, colored, one of the wrecking men, on the back of the head, and killed him instantly. Deceased lived below Landrum.

The last of the smallpox patients in the pest house at Raleigh were released Friday. To stamp out the disease has cost the city \$3,720.15—the principal items being guards and nurses, \$1,232; vaccination, \$1,842; buildings, \$804; clothing \$750; food, \$625; disinfectants, \$300. The number of cases treated at the pest house was seventy-one. Thirty-three were very serious cases. There were seventeen cases quarantined and treated near the city. Of those treated in the city, one was white and sixteen were colored. Of those in the suburbs three were white and none colored, this making a total of ninety-one cases. Out of this number only two deaths occurred, both in the city. Of those treated at the pest house not a single death occurred.
