

CAROLINA NEWS.

Craven county has in five years yielded the state \$5,331, revenue from the shell fish tax.

Members of the North Carolina synod committee on the college question were at Hickory yesterday, where they looked over the property of Lenoir college.

The jury in Raleigh yesterday awarded \$12,500 to Mr. Sam Coley against the Southern railway for the loss of his arm, which was cut off by the shifting engine in this city about two years ago.—Goldsboro Argus.

Since August 1 \$40,000 worth of new machinery has been placed in the Salisbury cotton mill and the mill has not had to shut down until Saturday. The employees are now enjoying a brief holiday while new dryers are being placed, says the Salisbury Sun.

Bishop Galloway comes to North Carolina next week in the interest of the twentieth century movement. He will speak as follows: Greensboro, Monday night, March 12; Winston, on Sunday, the 11th; Charlotte, 13; Salisbury, 14; Shelby, 15; Asheville, 16.

Jo. Mitchell has the champion rat catching cat in the state. It caught four rats at one time recently and held them. They were cleaning up the crib and got into some rats. Two ran out and the cat caught them and got them both in its mouth. Before it could kill them two more ran out and it caught them, one under each fore foot. Mr. Mitchell went to the cat's assistance and killed the two under her feet and the cat soon despatched the other two.—Wilkesboro Chronicle.

At Wilmington Thursday morning Mr. John Cane, a section foreman, fell from the top of a coal elevator at the Atlantic Coast line dock and received injuries from which he died. The unfortunate man was directing a force of men at work on the elevator, and in some unaccountable manner stumbled and fell from the dizzy height to the wharf below. Every bone in the victim's body was crushed, as well as his internal organs, yet he lived three hours and was conscious to the end.

We are sorry to hear of the painful accident that happened to the little son of Charlie McDowell last evening. Most boys like a gun and this one was more ingenious than others and went to work and made one for himself. He found an iron tube and drove a plug or iron in one end for a breechpin, and filed a hole in the tube for a touch hole. The device was answering all purposes intended until last evening when he held the gun up to take sight while another boy touched it off. When the powder exploded the plug blew out and struck the boy over the right eye, taking a downward course, and when Drs. Meadow and Turner were called in it was hard to find just where the plug was. It being so far in it was thought to be fatal to cut the bones and flesh to find it. It is feared the boy will die from the injuries.—Proximity Bulletin.

Saturday a license was obtained from the register of deeds of Pitt county for the marriage of Mr. Jesse James, of Bethel township, to the daughter of Mr. E. S. Lewis, of Belvoir township. Sunday young James went to Lewis' home for the purpose of wedding the girl. The father objected to the marriage and James left. Sunday night James, accompanied by his brother, Sam James, and some friends, again went to Lewis' home to take the girl by force. The father again objected and the visit resulted in a fight, rifles and pistols being used. When the smoke of battle cleared away Jesse James, the would-be bridegroom, was wounded, his brother Sam was dead and Mr. Lewis had a pistol ball in his hip and a wound on his head. The county coroner went out today to investigate the matter.

Burke county continues to furnish her neighboring counties and the northern markets as well with immense quantities of lumber. Now the most of the accessible pine timber has been cut, and the hardwoods are going rapidly. One of our Johns river farmers recently sold twenty walnut trees for \$500. The lumber was shipped to Germany in the log. One of the trees was six feet across the trunk and seventy feet to the first limb. This tree alone was worth what was paid for the twenty trees, so timber experts say. Outside of the fine plant of the Morgan Manufacturing and Trading Company, there are no large wood-working establishments in the county. A movement is now on foot here to establish another enterprise that will work up a part of our valuable timber at home.—Morganton Correspondence Charlotte Observer.

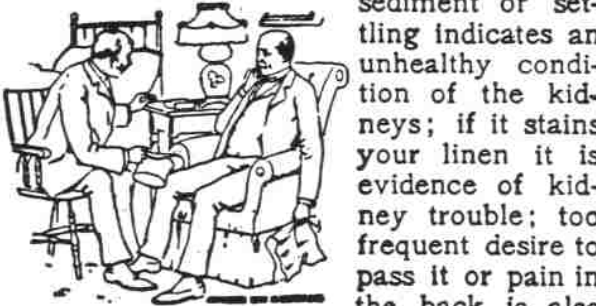

AMERICAN VINES NOT ADMITTED.

Strasburg, March 6.—The government of Alsace-Lorraine has declined to grant the petition of the vine growers of the Reichsland that they be permitted to import American grape vines in order to renew their ruined vineyards. Baron Zorn Von Bulach, secretary of state for agriculture, declared on the floor of the landtag that the American vines brought into the country were worse blights than phylloxera.

EXPANSION SENTIMENT.

Atlanta, March 6.—The democracy of Georgia will start its campaign by a meeting of the state executive committee on March 16, the convention to be called for a date in June. A problem confronting the managers is that the convention is sure to be a widely expansion body notwithstanding the position which is to be taken by the national committee. Fleming G. Dubignon, chairman of the executive committee, is a candidate to succeed Senator Bacon, who is in the field for re-election.

QUICK FIRING GUNS

Madrid March 6.—The cabinet has decided to utilize 7,000,000 pesetas remaining from the extraordinary estimates, in the purchase of quick-firing guns.

MANILA CABLE.

Washington, March 6.—The senate committee on naval affairs today ordered a favorable report on the bill to construct a cable to Manila.

TIDAL WAVES.

Something About These Marvelous Upliftings of the Sea Bosom.

What of the tidal wave, that mysterious, indispensable swelling of the waters that, following the "pull" of the moon, rolls round this globe of ours twice in each 24 hours, stemming the outflow of mighty rivers, penetrating far inland wherever access is available and doing within its short lease of life an amount of beneficent work freely that would beggar the wealthiest monarchy of the world to undertake if it must needs be paid for? Mysterious it may well be called, since, though its passage from zone to zone be so swift, it is like all other waves, but an undulatory movement of that portion of the sea momentarily influenced by the suasion of the planet—not, as is vulgarly supposed, the same mass of water vehemently carried onward for thousands of miles.

To meet a tidal wave at sea is in some parts of the world a grim and unforgettable experience. Floating upon the shining blue plain, with an indolent swelling of the surface, just giving a cozy roll to your ship now and then, you suddenly see in the distance a ridge, a knoll of water that advances, vast, silent, menacing. Nearer and nearer it comes, rearing its apparently endless curve higher and higher. There is no place to flee from before its face. Neither is there much suspense, for its pace is swift, although it appears so deliberate, from the illimitable grandeur of its extent. It is upon the ship, she behaves in accordance with the way she has been caught and her innate peculiarities. In any case, whatever her bulk, she is hurled forward, upward, backward, downward, as if never again could she regain an even keel, while her crew cling desperately to whatever holding place they may have reached.

Some will have it that these marvelous upliftings of the sea bosom are not tidal waves at all—that they do not belong to the normal ebb and flow of the ocean that owns the sway of the moon; if so, they would be met with more frequently than they are at sea, and far more disastrous would be placed to their account. This contention seems reasonable, because it is well known that lonely islets, such as St. Helena, Tristan d'Acunha and Ascension are visited at irregular intervals by a succession of appalling waves (rollers) that deal havoc among the smaller shipping and look as if they would overwhelm the land. The suggestion is that these stupendous waves are due to cosmic disturbance, to submarine earthquakes upheaving the ocean bed and causing so vast a displacement of the ocean that its undulations extend for several thousands of miles.—London Spectator.
