The jury brought in a verdict in favor of the mill, on the ground that the boy had been warned and the accident was the result of carelessness on his part.

The railroad companies must accept the rates on fertilizers prescribed in circular No. 1 of the corporation commission as well as the car load maximum of ten tons laid down in the same order. In addition, the companies, which were parties to the fertilizerrate case, must pay the state the difference between the receipts from the old rates and the rate prescribed by the commission accruing since the circular went into effect.

A disastrous collision occurred on the Atlantic Coast Line railroad Monday at Garysburg, near Weldon, in which two men were instantly killed, and three injured. No. 32, known as the Atlantic Coast line fast mail train, ran into an open switch at Garysberg, resulting in a collision with some freight cars.
