REGISTRATION.

The following circular letter has been issued by Thomas S. Rollins, Chm. Rep. Cong. Ex. Com.: Dear Sir:—In answer to numerous inquiries which have come to Congressional headquarters, it is stated for the information of the voters of the Ninth Congressional district, that the registration books for the November election will be open from sunrise to sunset on Monday, October 22nd, Tuesday, October 23rd, Wednesday, October 24th, Thursday, October 25th, Friday, October 26th, and Saturday, October 27th. On the last day of registration (Saturday, October 27th) the law requires the registrar to attend at the polling place with his books in order that persons may register there if they choose. On the other five days the registrar may register voters at any point in his precinct, but he shall give public notice of the place so that the voter may know where to find him. No new registration is required, but those who failed to register in the August election, and those who have since become qualified may do so on the dates above mentioned, and at no other time. Those who registered in the August election and have moved to other precincts are required to apply to the registrar and get a certificate of transfer before they will be allowed to register and vote. No person will be allowed to register and vote unless he has been a resident
