The Scotland Neck cotton mills will be enlarged.

An overall factory has been put in operation at Haw River.

After July 1st, there will be two schools and two dispensaries in Northampton county.

On May 7th the people of Oxford will vote on the question of establishing graded schools.

Rev. E. A. Osborne will move to Monroe to become pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal church.

Franklin, Macon county, had a fire last week and the Episcopal school building was destroyed.

There are persons who have the belief that oil will be found in Chatham county, in the region of the coal fields. It is asserted that oil is observed on several of the streams.

State Secretary Vance sent a check to the National Council Jr. O. U. A. M., for \$896, this being half of the State Council's annual per capita tax. The tax is paid semi-annually—in April and October.

Grand Secretary Woodall has completed his annual report of the Odd Fellows in North Carolina. It shows 125 lodges, an increase of 13 over last report; 7,113 members, increase 1,592; number of members relieved, 994; expended in relief, \$12,964; receipts of subordinate lodges, \$14,476 increase, \$3,326; net assets of subordinate lodges, \$103,726. All shows the greatest increase on record.
