ADVANCES IN RAILWAY LIST

Highest, Lowest and Closing Prices For Active Stocks Cotton Market Point.

New York, May 8.—The market is reacting in spite of the quite sensational advance in N. P. 10 per cent premium paid for use. Fight for control between Harriman and Hill-Morgan interests. Brokers complain the violent fluctuations in N. P. are injuring trading. Alliance between Union, Northwest and St. Paul still confidently predicted. Hill-followers delay buying Canada Pacific. Insiders in Canada Pacific claim advance fully justified on dividend and earning capacity. Trunk lines refuse request for lower rates on iron products. Reported sales of Red Star Line to Morgan shipping consolidation not confirmed. Consolidated Gas insiders bullish. Insiders do not confirm reported telegraph consolidation. London buying Southern combined and preferred. Bull interests prevalent on C. & O.

COTTON. New York, May 8.—There was great pressure in July this morning at the opening, a good many weak longs getting out and a good many shorts getting in, regarding the opportunity as favorable for making a quick turn on account of the bearish sentiment of the past few days which apparently has no good basis. The view was taken by a good many that the market was rapidly drifting to a much stronger position. Shrewd operators are completely ignoring the course of the near months which are dominated almost wholly by sentiment and giving their attention to October and beyond, which will be dominated by the weather. We need rain in Texas and some other districts. July quickly rallied 4 points after a large number of stop orders had been executed. Leading local German firms averaged extensively in August. Weather south was fair, the only rain being light falls at Memphis and Charleston. At Liverpool prices were 4 7/8 points lower for futures and 3 3/8 down for spot cotton. Estimated receipts at

the ports were 13,000, against 4000 last year.

GRAIN.

New York, May 8.—The market opened quiet and lower this morning on account of favorable weather at the west and the fact that the details of the government promise for spring wheat. The weather was cold in the northwest, but elsewhere favorable. After a lower opening the market rallied and there were reports of some branch damage and cables were higher but the foreign trade was insignificant all the morning. St. Louis market was quite pronounced in strength and rumors were current of some winter wheat damage. Wheat was very quiet in the afternoon and quiet demand. The close was easy. CORN.—The market was fairly active and rather irregular. Nervousness prevailed in the May delivery, and all advices still claim that Phillips has complete control. The car lots today were 241 with 66 contract and 67 cars were received from private elevators. In the last three days at Chicago about 150,000 bushels of contract corn per day have been inspected from private elevators. Sales there yesterday were reported at 1,050,000 bushels, including 400,000 bushels reported by Phillips the previous night. Weather conditions out side of the frosts in the northwest were generally favorable. Corn was quiet and lower late with local trade. PROVISIONS.—Trade was very dull opening quiet, and quotations showed a slight loss owing to large live hog reduction, prices improving later, with high trade. Provisions were dull and easier at the close.

New York, May 8.—There was a nervous and uneasy feeling in Wall street this morning as a result of sensational rumors afloat regarding developments in Northern Pacific. Quotations from London, however, showed that there was heavy selling of Americans there. The 2 o'clock quotations from London showed a break of 10% in Northern Pacific, 4% the preferred, 5 3/8 in Canada Pacific, 2% in New York Central, 2 1/8 in Louisville and 1 to 2 points in other stocks. Northern Pacific opened on the local exchange with such a series of wild and violent fluctuations as were never before witnessed in this market. The shorts were in an unenviable predicament. Compared with last night's price of 143 1/2 the first sale of 2000 shares of Northern Pacific was at 155 with quick successive sales as follows: 300 at 159; 500 at 160; 1000 at 165; 2000 at 175; 1000 at 175; 2000 at 180; 1000 at 175; 300 at 183; 1000 at 175; 100 at 175; 1000 at 170; 100 at 178; 500 at 160 and 100 at 155. This measured the range of 25 points within three minutes after the opening. Meantime in the rest of the list there was heavy selling at the opening breaks in prices of 2 to 4 1/2 points in the principal leading stocks dealt in. Northern Pacific preferred pursued a downward course in the face of the excited buying of the common stock. Fluctuations in all stocks were wide and excited, high priced stocks and futures covering a range of from 3 to 6 points. At noon the market was quieter than for months and there was a general disposition to trade cautiously in view of the sensational events of the day. Bonds were irregular. Northern Pacific pursued a very erratic course after midday, with fluctuations of 5 points occurring on transactions of only 100 shares. The price got

up as high as 170 again. Union Pacific rose to 129 1/2, but fears that absorption by developments in Northern Pacific caused Burlington to break 10% to 186. The whole market broke with violence again.
