GLIMPSES OF LIFE IN THE OLD NORTH STATE

Floating Items That Show the Trend of Industrial and Social Progress.

EVENTS OF INTEREST IN THE LAND OF THE SKY

Gleanings From the Columns of the Local Papers in Various Towns of State.

Greensboro is to have a public library and the subscriptions to the Greensboro Public Library now amount to 2,500. It is hoped to open the library as soon as the city hall, where rooms have been secured, is completed.

The United States Civil Service commission announces that on June 15, 1901, an examination will be held in any city in the United States where postal free delivery has been established for the position of meat inspectors; also on June 3, in same class of cities, for position of editorial clerk. Blank forms and information furnished by the Civil Service commission.

A report from Marion, N. C., states that H. L. Murray and son, of Williamsport, Pa., have purchased from the Western North Carolina Land company 25,000 acres of valuable timber lands in the Blue Ridge mountains. The property is already in course of development, with sawmills in operation upon it. The new company proposes to begin work at once upon a much larger scale.

The people of North Carolina will perhaps be surprised to learn that nearly, if not all the cotton seed oil mills in the state have been sold to some gigantic corporation, the name of which is being withheld, but generally supposed to be the American Cotton Seed Oil company. Such, however, is a positive fact, the only mill known to your correspondent now included and not already in some corporation being the Swift Creek Manufacturing company, a small plant situated at Wren- dale, Edgecombe county, and which has not yet been approached.—Tarboro correspondent Raleigh Post.

Secretary Bruner of the North Carolina Agricultural department says in answer to inquiries as to the profitable disposal of the surplus strawberry crops, "I see at a glance that there must be a very great waste of the strawberries just as soon as the price becomes so low as to make the shipment of the berries prohibitive. I am satisfied, that by co-operation, a jam factory would result in some profit to the people. It is a simple process of boiling and sweetening the fruit, and putting it in glass tumblers or jars and labelling with a neat label, containing a special guarantee of "pure fruit." Such a product would find ready sale in all of the grocery stores of the land."

He also suggests the manufacture of wine vinegar.

The North Carolina experiment station has issued a strong argument against the custom of selling eggs by the dozen instead of by the pound. France, and in fact all of Europe, sell them by weight rather than by count. The North Carolina experiments show that where weighed they showed a difference of 100 per cent. between the largest and the smallest. If a small egg is worth one cent, it is perfectly reasonable that one twice its size should bring two cents. The food value of the egg depends upon its size and weight, but the market value merely upon the fact that it is an egg. One might as well buy his potatoes by the dozen.

Mr. T. L. Leavy was up town yesterday with his left arm in splints, as the result of a bicycle accident while he was on his way home the previous evening. As he was speeding down South Tryon street a dog ran out in front of him. It was just opposite the Butler property. The dog was after a cat and had neither eye nor ear for the wheelman. As a result he struck the bicycle between wheels. The dog's neck was caught in the chain and carried to the sprocket wheel, where it was cut off as neatly as a guillotine could have done it. That ended the incident for the dog, of course. The wheel was badly wrecked and Mr. Leavy was given a terrific fall, the result being that his arm was broken in three places—two fractures being between the wrist and elbow and one between the elbow and shoulder. The cat escaped. —Charlotte Observer.

The executive committee of the commercial bodies of Philadelphia arranged a program for the Southern Industrial convention, which will open there on Tuesday, June 11. The committee also arranged for the entertainment of the delegates while there on visits to the large industrial establishments the navy yard and other points of interest. The welcoming address will be responded to by President H. H. Hargrove, of the Southern Industrial association; Governor Longino, of Mississippi, and General Julian S. Carr, of Durham, N. C. An evening session will be held each day of the convention. On the first day will be opened with an address on "The Resources of the South," by Hoke Smith, ex-Secretary of the Interior, who will be followed by the governors of the Southern States or their representatives.
