Every man present realized the need of one before the day was over and any one who doubts the need of a new court house should have been present at this trial yesterday. The most overwhelming argument that could be advanced was the uncomfortably crowded condition of both the seats for the public and the members of the bar. The aisles were constantly filled not only with spectators but taxmen who could not obtain seats.

In all cities elsewhere the size of Asheville and in counties the size of Buncombe there are court houses with modern conveniences and now that public spirited men have paved the way we should have a court house commensurate with our needs.

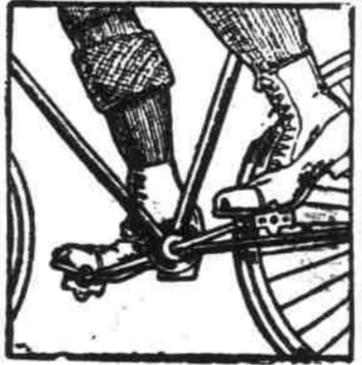

TRUSTEE'S SALE.
