TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

New York, June 6.—Georgia bankers to the number of 93 arrived here to-day on steamers from Norfolk, Va.

Memphis, June 6.—In a letter to a friend here, Jim Scanlan, the Pittsburg middle-weight, says he will probably never enter the ring again.

New York, June 6.—The Consolidated Tobacco Company, incorporated in New Jersey on Wednesday, was formally organized in this city to-day.

Atlanta, Ga., June 6.—The Rev. Dr. F. H. Kerfoot, corresponding secretary of the Baptist Home Mission Board, is critically ill at his home in this city.

London, June 6.—It is said that an examination of the hull of the Shamrock II, shows that no injury was suffered there in consequence of the recent accident.

Birmingham, Ala., June 6.—A special prosecutor, Governor Sanford, extremely ill. His family have been telegraphed for.

Washington, June 6.—The President today made a large number of appointments to the regular army, among them Fitzhugh Lee, Jr., to be first lieutenant in the cavalry arm.

Cleveland, June 6.—Senator M. A. Hanna has been appointed a colonel on the official staff of General Rastleur, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Vicksburg, Miss., June 6.—Ten persons were injured, three seriously, in a head-on collision between two Mississippi Valley passenger trains this morning north of Vicksburg.

London, June 6.—The Chinese Government, says the Financial correspondent of the Daily Express, "has ordered that bonds be prepared for the payment of the indemnity."

Berlin, June 6.—The Hamburger correspondent publishes a dispatch from The Hague, asserting that the Arbitration Court yesterday held a secret session regarding the war in South Africa.

Milwaukee, Wis., June 6.—The Paine Brewing Company suffered a loss by fire to-night to the extent of between \$100,000 and \$200,000, fully covered by insurance. One man was killed during the progress of the fire.

Havana, June 6.—Official instructions from Washington regarding the Platt amendment have arrived. They are being translated and will be sent to the Cuban Constitutional Convention tomorrow.

Jacksonville, Fla., June 6.—The coroner's jury holding the inquest over the body of James MacAllister, who was killed in the house of T. H. West yesterday afternoon, adjourned to-night till tomorrow, without reaching a verdict.

New York, June 6.—At the monthly meeting to-day of the board of managers of the American Bible Society, the Rev. J. H. Wringe, of Newman, Ga., was appointed a special agent to work among the colored population of the Southern States.

New York, June 6.—The winning of Hepcat at 10 to 1 was the feature of the racing at Gravesend to-day. He made most of the running in the second race, and saved long enough to win by a head in a hard drive from Bluff. Landry had the mount.

New York, June 6.—The atmosphere in yachting circles to-night was cleared by the arrival in New York of W. Barker Duncanson, Jr., from Newport, with the information that the Constitution would be ready for the trial races with the Columbia within two weeks.

New York, June 6.—George W. Curren, known to the American stage as George W. Thompson, "Father of the Elks," is dead in Brooklyn, from blood poisoning, following an operation upon his hand. Funeral services will be held tomorrow. He was born in New York city in 1836.

BOERS SURPRISED AND ROUTED.

Pratois, Wednesday, June 5.—Colonel Wilson, with 240 of Kitchener's scouts, has surprised and routed 400 Boers belonging to the Boers command thirty-four miles west of Warm Baths. The Boers resisted stubbornly, but finally broke and fled, leaving thirty-seven dead, a hundred prisoners and all their wagons and supplies, including 8000 cattle, in the hands of the British. The loss of the latter was three men killed and fifteen wounded.

Beyers' main command arrived on the scene soon after the engagement, but failed in an attempt to recapture the supplies. Beyers was thus left practically without any transport or supplies.
