THE EARTH QUAKED

CLOUDS ABOVE MOUNT PELEE MAS DESTRUCTIVE AS AT THE GREAT OUTBREAK.

Port De France, June 7.—It is reported from Morne Rouge that yesterday's eruption of Mount Pelee was very severe. Hot ashes and stones fell. There was violent trembling of the earth and rivers overflowed. Captain Thiron of the French cable steamer says he was five minutes off St. Pierre picking up a broken cable when the eruption occurred. The ship was covered with stones. The captain sailed away, as he feared his men would be asphyxlated. The eruption and dense clouds were as destructive looking as the great outbreak which swept off St. Pierre.


