IMPEACHMENT OF JUDGE JACKSON

WILL BE ATTEMPTED BY STRIKE LEADERS WHOM HE HAS OFFENDED.

Secretary of United Mine Workers Gives Official Notice of This Intention.

NO POLITICS IN THE IMPEACHMENT PROCEEDINGS

JOHN G. LEHR, WHO CALLED JUDGE JACKSON A SKUNK, SENTENCED TO NINETY DAYS IN JAIL FOR CONTEMPT.

Indianapolis, July 26.—The United Mine Workers may try to obtain the impeachment of Federal Judge Jackson, of West Virginia, who restrained them from holding meetings to induce men to quit work, and imprisoned a number of organizers for violating an injunction, if after a final hearing he refuses to dissolve the injunction.

Secretary Wilson admitted today that the miners contemplate this course and that a complete transcript of the case, including the complaints and Judge Jackson's decision, will be prepared for submission to President Roosevelt and the senate.

The miners also intend to give the public evidence in the case. Secretary Wilson says that if the impeachment proceedings are begun there will be no politics in them. The miners will not ask President Roosevelt to interfere with the injunction, as he says they realize that the president is without power as to injunctions, but if the habeas corpus proceedings fail to release the organizers, the president will be asked to pardon them. The habeas corpus proceedings will be begun as soon as the papers can be made out.

Indianapolis, July 26.—Secretary Wilson says impeachment proceedings will be instituted against Judge Jackson. Wilson says Judge Jackson used his judicial position to protect his interests as a stockholder in a coal company, and that he bullied defendants in open court and told them they were guilty before a single witness had been sworn.

Wheeling, W. Va., July 26.—John L. Gehr, the strike leader who called Judge Jackson a skunk, was arraigned in court at Parkersburg this afternoon and sentenced to ninety days in jail for contempt. He made a speech defending his actions and it culminated in a plea of guilty.

HAYTI IN THE THROES OF CIVIL WAR

FIRM MARCHING ON PORT AU PRINCE—PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT DISSOLVED.

Washington, July 26.—Tumultuous conditions continue in Hayti, according to advices received today at the state department from Minister Powell, who is at Port Au Prince. He cables that civil war has been declared throughout the country, and that General Firmin, an aspirant for the presidency, is now marching on Port Au Prince. The provisional government has been dissolved. The acting president has sent a communication to the diplomatic corps declaring that Admiral Killick is a pirate and asking that "the naval vessels of foreign countries capture him wherever found. Precedents show that the naval powers have decided to pay no attention to any such proclamation, but to regard men in Killick's position as simply rebels.

RECEIVED \$25,000 ON GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS

IS THE CHARGE COL. COLSON BRINGS AGAINST CONGRESSMAN BOREING.

Frankfort, Ky., July 26.—Col. David Colson charges that Congressman Boreing received \$25,000 on government contracts while a member of congress, and says he will bring the matter to the attention of the Federal authorities with a view to bringing about an indictment.

TWO WERE KILLED AND SEVEN INJURED

BY EXPLOSION OF BOILERS—CITY OF KEY WEST IN DARKNESS.

Key West, July 26.—Curry Son's ice and electric plant exploded this morning. Three boilers burst, demolishing the entire building. Two firemen were killed and seven injured. The entire city is in darkness tonight.

TROUBLE IN PARIS IS ANTICIPATED

Paris, July 26.—The garrison of Paris is confined to barracks and all leave has been stopped for Sunday. In consequence of anticipated demonstrations over the enforcement of the religious associations law. The expulsion of the sisters at Monvaux led to a conflict between the mob and the police in which a commissary of gendarmes and ten rioters were injured. Two arrests were made.

AMERICAN HORSE FOR CAVALRY IN INDIA

New Orleans, July 26.—The British transport trade for supplying the British army with mules and horses will be resumed here August 20, when a cargo of horses will be shipped direct from Port Chalmette to India. The horses needed for the British cavalry in India will be shipped altogether from the United States.

BRYAN WILL CRUISE ON LEWIS NIXON'S YACHT

Meriden, Conn., July 26.—Wm. J. Bryan arrived here today from Maine. After luncheon at the Hotel Winthrop he delivered an address at Hanover park.

Bridgeport, July 26.—Bryan arrived from Meriden this afternoon, and will be the guest of Archibald McNeill over Sunday, and with his daughter will leave tomorrow evening on Lewis Nixon's yacht for a cruise to Block Island.

PORTO RICAN OFFICIALS

New York, July 26.—Gov. William H. Hunt and Attorney General James S. Garlan of Porto Rico arrived aboard the steamship Coamo today, for a two months' vacation.

SEABOARD BUYS O. R. & C. ROAD

DIRECT LINE FROM COAL MINES TO LINCOLNTON IS CONTEMPLATED.

Will Be Shortest Route From Virginia Fields to the Atlantic Coast.

DEAL WAS FINANCED BY UNION TRUST CO.

PURCHASE IS THAT OF THE SOUTH & WESTERN, A NEW COMPANY WHICH OWNS THE OHIO RIVER & CHARLESTON ROAD.

Baltimore, July 26.—It is announced here that the Seaboard Air Line has bought the South & Western railroad. The latter is a new company under which two or more roads will be constructed. It owns the Ohio River & Charleston railway, which it is proposed to extend from the coal fields of Southwest Virginia to Lincolnton, N. C., where, according to the plans, connection is to be made with the Seaboard Air Line. The scheme for this development was financed by the Union Trust company of this city.

The promoters of the scheme announce that the route planned will be the shortest line from the Virginia coal fields to the Atlantic coast and the south. The proposed road will be about 275 miles long, but it is thought that the mileage will be increased to about 428 miles by its extension in a northerly direction.

Connection may be with the Detroit Southern at Ironton, Ohio.

Knoxville, Tenn., July 26.—The Sentinel says this afternoon: The Ohio River & Charleston road extends from Johnson City, Tenn., to Hunt Dale, N. C., a distance of thirty-four miles. It was originally the Tennessee section of the Charleston, Cincinnati & Chicago project. The Carolina portion of this three C road was built from Camden, S. C., to Marion, N. C., 171 miles, and is now known as the South Carolina & Georgia extension, and is controlled by the Southern railway. The O. R. & C. was recently sold by Samuel Hunt's company to the South & Western, of which George L. Carter of Bristol is president. Mr. Carter is the man who organized the Virginia Iron, Coal & Coke company and the Virginia & Southwestern Railway company. It is understood that the plan is to extend the O. R. & C. from Hunt Dale to Lincolnton, a distance of 150 miles, and connect with the S. A. L. at Lincolnton. From Johnson City it is proposed to extend the road up into the Virginia coal fields a distance of about 100 miles.

BALANCED OVER A YAWNING CHASM

NARROW ESCAPE OF 15 PASSENGERS IN A CAR ON A HIGH BRIDGE OVER A RIVER.

Columbia, S. C., July 26.—An accommodation train consisting of seven freight cars and one passenger car had a perilous experience on the Blue Ridge road this evening. Fifteen passengers were in the coach. In the middle of the high bridge over the Seneca River a freight car jumped the track, falling fifty feet into the river. Others followed leaving the passenger coach just balancing between life and death. When the passengers paralyzed with fright recovered they crawled from the rear end of the car to the trestle.

New York, July 26.—Among the passengers who arrived on the Old Dominion steamship Jefferson today were J. E. Harding and Mrs. Ida Stafford, who eloped from Greensboro, N. C., Thursday.

Caesar Cone, a former Greensboro resident, who now lives in New York, met the couple when the boat landed. A. B. Kimball, a lawyer, representing Harding's father was also on the pier. Harding after some talk with Cone and Kimball called a cab and was driven to the Broadway Central hotel. Passengers said the couple had spent most of the time on deck. Their public love-making had attracted considerable attention. Kimball said Harding's father had instructed him to bring the young man home if possible and to make him agree to separation.

Late tonight the lawyer and Harding are still consulting. It is believed the couple intend to sail for Europe.

TEXAS CORPORATIONS FAIL TO COMPLY WITH THE LAW

Austin, Texas, July 26.—More than one thousand of the domestic and foreign corporations doing business in Texas have failed to comply with the provisions of the Texas anti-trust law. The attorney general will institute suits against them for forfeiture of their respective charters and permits to do business in Texas.

FITZSIMMONS TO BRING SUIT AGAINST A NEWSPAPER THAT CHARGES FRIDAY NIGHT'S FIGHT A FAKE.

Both Combatants Suffering in Body and Spirit from Their Awful Affray in the Ring.

JEFFRIES' BEAUTY CONSIDERABLY DAMAGED

A BLOW THAT FITZSIMMONS GOT OVER THE HEART BEGAN TO PAIN HIM MANY HOURS AFTERWARDS.

San Francisco, July 26.—Robert Fitzsimmons, goaded to the point of desperation by a fake story printed by a daily paper here to the effect that he had "laid down" to Jeffries in the fight last night will begin suit against W. R. Hearst, W. W. Naughton and E. H. Hamilton, of the staff of the publication involved, charging damages at \$100,000.

Amid tears Fitzsimmons stamped as a "lie" the imputation that the fight had been a fake. He said: "I got what I gave many a good man. It was the same blow that I gave Corbett only it was a little to one side, but it did the business. Some time during the fight Jeffries got in one that caught me under the heart. I did not feel it much then, but this morning about 2 o'clock it caught me good and I thought I was going to die. I can't raise my left hand now."

Jeffries was a terrible spectacle today. His face was swollen to twice its usual size. Three stitches had to be taken over his left eye. He had a bad cut on the left cheek and his lip was swollen. He was sore also in spirit for he recognized he had been outclassed in science and only his great strength had pulled him through.
